

Not everyone gets to live their dream job, the one they've set their sights on since childhood, but Lee McCarthy has, and he seems to have come by it naturally. He had the good looks, the voice and style, as well as what journalists used to call "a nose for news." He also had enough ambition,

dedication and lucky


breaks to become a network correspondent for the NBC News in Washington, DC and later news anchor for WTAF-TV, now WTFX-TV Channel 29, in Philadelphia. His 30-year career in television has been filled with thrilling moments covering US Presidents, winning two Emmys, and covering the Pope.

"At 16, I had set a goal to become a network correspon-

dent for NBC," Lee told me. "I grew up in Youngstown [Ohio], in a household where The Huntley-Brinkley Report was turned on every night. I admired them and wanted to be like them." In high school, Lee joined the speech team where his speech teacher and coach, who also happened to be the local TV sportscaster, recognized Lee's potential. "He took me out of a Junior Achievement company and put me on camera doing live commercials for the

local Youngstown station WKBN," Lee says. "That was my first lucky break and my first job in television. I got the broadcasting bug."

Lee later attended Notre Dame University where he ran the student radio station. In 1965, "on the Friday before I graduated, the assistant station manager of WYTV, another Youngstown TV station, called and offered me



a job (lucky break #2). They were starting a news department from scratch, so I helped get it off the ground. Their former news director had left taking his entire staff with him. For a while I was news director, anchorman and the entire reporting staff." Lee was on his way to achieving his goal.

Photograph of Lee taken by Sally Shabaker Shortly thereafter, Lee married Bobbie (lucky break #3), now his wife of 49 years. Bobbie was from Jasper, Indiana. Consequently, the couple would visit her family there frequently. Lee became friendly with the news director of an Indianapolis TV station and told him of his ambition to become a national correspondent for NBC news. He advised Lee to apply for a job with WTOP, the

punctuated by more lucky breaks. He got his first big assignment when Washington's Cardinal O'Boyle fired 44 priests. "Because I was the only Catholic on the news staff, I got the story. For nine weeks they ran it as the lead story. That really helped to establish my credibility as a news reporter, and NBC offered me a job," says Lee. His really big break came in the summer of 1975 when he was asked by NBC

CBS affiliate in Washington, DC. "He told me, 'If you can make it there, you can do it anywhere.' They had an opening for a traffic reporter, so I went for an interview, and the two men doing the hiring were from Youngstown, Ohio," (lucky break #4).

Lee got the job doing traffic reports in the morning and television street reporting in the afternoons. "I worked in a newsroom filled with novice reporters who eventually were famous newsmen such as Sam Donaldson, who became the White House correspondent for ABC, and David French, who joined CNN. Every one of us in that newsroom became a network journalist," Lee notes.

Lee's one-and-a-half years at WTOP were

– on 48 hours' notice – to fill in for vacationing network correspondents in London, Rome, Paris and Bonn. He was supposed to spend one week in each city, but after filing his first story in London, he was sent to cover the Portuguese Revolution in 1975. A radi-

cal faction within the Portuguese
Armed Forces revolted against
the government. Until that day
Portugal had been under a fascist
dictatorship for over half a century. Lee thought he would spend
a weekend there, but it turned into
seven weeks. "I turned in 21 stories and got all kinds of exposure on
NBC. I never got to the three other
cities. When I returned to Washington, Tom Brokaw commended
me on my work. Shortly after,
I was called to NBC in New
York where I was offered a

network contract. I suspect

with that," says Lee. At that moment, Lee had achieved his lifetime goal.

"I was given the choice of working in Boston or Beirut. Being an Irishman, I naturally chose Boston where I covered the Boston busing crisis and opened the Boston bureau. We covered most of the lower 48, Canada and 18 foreign countries." While in Boston, Lee also reported on what he calls "the best soap opera in the world" – the notorious Klaus Von Bulow case.

One day, Tom Pettit, then executive vice president of NBC News, invited Lee to have breakfast with

him. Pettit told Lee that Roger Mudd wanted him on his news team in Washington. He would be one of 28 correspondents in Washington's bureau. Lee, with his wife and four children, moved to the nation's capital once again, where Lee began doing lengthy news features for the weekend editions of NBC Nightly News.

During his career, he has made seven trips to Israel and Egypt, the longest assignment lasting for seven weeks. He's covered Pope John Paul II's visit to the Dominican Republic, and traveled with Vice President George Bush on his 20-day visit to Europe. "I had

the opportunity to visit the Papal residence, view his private chapel and see the Vatican library."



Lee was dedicated to his work and proved himself to be an excellent television news reporter. In 1975, he received a regional Emmy for "Outstanding Individual Achievement in News Reporting." His five-part series on carcinogens in the water of the 40 largest cities in the United State moved Congress to amend the Safe Drinking Water Act. Five years later Lee was awarded a national Emmy for "Outstanding Program Achievement." It's a long story about how he obtained on-the-scene footage of a fishing boat sinking off the coast of Nova Scotia. It turned out to be the "spot news story of the year" broadcast on many NBC affiliates. Lee and his cameraman just happened to be in the right place at the right time.

By 1986 it was time to move on. Lee was getting tired of all the traveling network news required. In addition, the McCarthys were expecting their fifth child. He wanted a less taxing job with regular hours so he could be more available to his family. His opportunity came when WTAF (Channel 29) in Philadelphia offered him the post as news anchor for the Delaware Valley's only prime time newscast.

Although they had never lived in the Philadelphia area, "we found it to be a real gem," says Lee.

Although the answer lies in the life he led, I have to ask: What is the secret to finding fulfilling work and having success in such a challenging career? Without hesitation, Lee answers "First you have to aspire to it. Then when you get on track, you have to stay on track. Set goals till you finally get where you want to be and then work really hard."

Upclose with Lee

How long have you lived in Hershey's Mill? Seven years. Our realtor found the house. We took one look at it and said, "This is it." We like all the amenities, too.

Where did you live before moving here? We downsized from a five bedroom house in Berwyn to a townhouse in Chester Springs. Then Bobbie had a knee replacement, so we wanted one floor living.

Best thing about retirement? It gave me a chance to do things at my own pace and enabled me to teach broadcast

journalism at Villanova for 12 years and earn a master's degree while there.

What is your favorite hobby or activity? Golf, until arthritis kicked in. I read a lot, and I enjoy cooking. I don't bake, but I make one mean pound cake.

In what activities are you involved at Hershey's Mill? I've been the program director at Channel 20 for about three years. I think it's a very good volunteer TV station. I'm also editor of the Quaker Village newsletter, and on the writing team for the Hershey's Mill Players' 2016 show.





Yes, there's now a Teca in Newtown Square! Opened just two months ago, it is owned and operated by the same folks as the one in West Chester. Teca Newtown Square is located in the one-time Newtown Squire Restaurant which opened more than 50 years ago and was in business for many years after. It became Alberto's Newtown

Teca Newtown Square enjoyed a full-scale renovation "inclusive of all mechanicals in the restaurant, banquet facility, lounge/bar and new garden." It is modeled on Guadagnini's Italian villa/winery Casali di Bibbiano in Tuscany. The cuisine is traditional yet contemporary Italian (fresh house-made pastas, whole fish and Neapolitan-style pizza) with an exceptional wine list.

Four of us enjoyed a delightful dinner with outstanding service – enough attention but not intru-

savory tomato, garlic and chili; grilled octopus; roasted beet tartar; or grilled *langoustine* with lemon, garlic and estate olive oil.

sive of conversations. True to its roots, most dishes are listed in Italian; some familiar, but others needed explanation. That made it fun to learn new dishes.







First, don't twist my arm to condone the marketing sins of golf companies who should have known better. Some clubs and golf businesses may suffer, even fail. Let's not call a "company save strategy" a "game growth strategy" – that's misleading.

Don't make me part of inauthentic schemes to cajole the unsuspecting into this venerable game by offering them illusions about some wistful nature outing filled with mindless giggling. That's misleading too. Certainly, there is a place for these diversions of floating orbs on our "links lands" but not at the forefront. Start by asking the right questions. The real answers to marketing golf are right here in front of us. Mostly golf is about self-discovery, redemption and sportsmanship. It has all the elements – exhilaration and tragedy – just like real life. Start there.

Microsoft is going to get its operating system right this time. Consumers liked Windows XP and Windows 7. They hated Windows Vista and Windows 8 although Windows 8.1 is somewhere in the neutral zone. Microsoft has made Windows 10 available for free to test and send feedback to Microsoft. The feedback system seems to be working as many users are communicating their likes and dislikes. During this period, Microsoft is continually updating Windows 10 with new features. Windows 10 will remain in a test phase for the next 6 to 8 months before the final version is released on new PCs. This is the first time Microsoft has bent over backwards to communicate and listen to users about a new operating system.

Now for the really good news – Microsoft has decided to make Windows 10 available to users of Windows 7, 8 and 8.1 for **free** when it's released. The free upgrade will last for a year after the release date. The only concern I have is whether the programs installed on your current system will remain intact after the upgrade. Your files and other data should be no problem.

Let's take a look at some of the new features of Windows 10. It atones for one of Windows 8's greatest sins by returning the Start menu to its rightful spot in the lower-left-hand corner of the desktop. But rather than focusing on desktop apps alone, the Windows 10 Start menu mixes in a dash of the tile screen's functionality, sprinkling Live Tiles of Windows 8-style apps next to shortcuts of the more traditional PC software. These tiles (apps) can be turned off and make the desktop appear like Windows 7 - or you can have something in between. The choice is yours.

In Windows 10, launching a Live Tile app on your PC opens it in a desktop window, rather than dumping you into a full-screen app. Previously, users got "lost" in the full-screen mode wondering what to click. The windowed apps have a mouse-friendly toolbar of options across the top, and alter the interface to fit the size of the window.

Windows 10 includes a handy "Continuum" feature that dynamically switches the interface between the PC-friendly desktop and a Windows 8-like mode that's better suited for fingers, depending on how you're using the device. In other words, Windows 10 will adjust

itself automatically if you are using a touchscreen or a mouse.

The Action Center, a white flag icon near the clock in Windows 8 and 8.1, will be expanded and become more useful in Windows 10.

One of the strange design choices within Windows 8 was the separation of Settings into two buckets, one each for the Desktop and the tile interfaces. With Windows 10, that goes away. Now, there is one Settings menu, avail-

The American experience at Valley Forge during the winter of 1777-78 is widely considered a turning point in the Revolutionary War. And many credit Gen. George Washington's persuasive argument to the Continental Congress that defeating the British depended on

delegation to evaluate the condition of the Army. In January 1778, the Congressional Committee arrived at Valley Forge to investigate the need to reform the Army. The committee included delegates from Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, Pennsylvania and Virginia; as noted by Wayne Bodle in his book *The Valley Forge Winter*.

General Washington And The Challenge Of The **Quartermaster Department**

improved logistics for the Continental Army. Washington achieved this by managing a committee of delegates sent by the Congress to Valley Forge.

In December 1777, Washington led a defeated Army of nearly 11,000 troops, of which only 8,200 were fit for duty, into winter encampment at Valley Forge. The campaign for Pennsylvania that began in September had been a disaster, with defeats at Brandywine and Germantown, and the loss of Philadelphia to the British Army. Congress had fled to York, PA, and the Army was facing a serious shortage of food, ammunition, medicines, blankets, clothing and shoes.

The lack of material support for the troops stemmed from mismanagement by the Quartermaster Department and the failure of Congress to grasp the gravity of the situation. As early as October, Washington wrote to Congress in York asking that it send a

Two weeks before the Congressional Committee's arrival, Washington had his staff officers draw up a 38-page report, "Representation to the Committee of Congress," that covered the conditions of recruitment of regular soldiers, including officers, and the question of supplies. In this report, Washington exaggerated poor conditions in the Army and said the prob-

lems threatened to break it up; this according to Bodle, who is assistant professor of history at Indiana University of Pennsylvania. Thus Washington provided the committee with an agenda and put himself in position to influence its findings.

Members of the committee then wrote to the governors of neighboring states with a plea to send emergency food supplies to the Army. The committee reported back to Congress in York with the urging that it authorize the pur-



chase and transport of needed supplies to Valley Forge.

A key to the supply problem was the struggle between the Board of War and Washington over control of the Quartermaster Department. The Board of War was

a creation of the Congress made up of senior military officers charged with the administration and organization of the entire Army. The key member of the board was Gen. Horatio Gates, the victor in the Saratoga Campaign, who is thought by a number of historians to have been a rival for Washington's command.

Washington, who knew of Gates' ambition, understood that, to be an effective commander, he would have to have a loyal officer as quartermaster general. So Washington persuaded a trusted colleague, Gen. Nathanael Greene, to take the post, and Congress agreed. Thus, the Board of War had its powers



By the spring of 1778, the supply problem had been solved. But the winter encampment had cost the Army: 2,500 soldiers were dead of expo-

sure, malnutrition and disease; and 1,000 more had deserted - this according to Benson Bobrick in the book Angel in the Whirlwind: The Triumph of the American Revolution.

New recruits came in, and Washington went on to victory over the British at Yorktown. Later, he helped found the Republic and became its first president, setting a number of presidential precedents that have become part of the American tradition.

Our modern interpretations are based on ancient Roman recipes from around the untimely end of Caesar—XLIV BC (that's 44 BC for people challenged by Roman numerals).

Sweet Cheesecake

Libum (sweet cheesecake) was often a sacrificial offering to the spirits of the household. We like to offer this yummy ditty up to our taste buds when only something a bit sweet will do. Can be served at room temperature or warm (our preference).

Time: 1h 25m (10 minutes active) Serves 4

½ cup all-purpose flour % cup cake flour

8 ounces ricotta cheese

1 extra large egg

4 bay leaves

²⁄₃ cup honey

Preheat oven to 425°F with rack in lower third of oven. In a bowl or mixer, whisk the cheese until very light. In a separate bowl, sift the flours together; make sure there are no lumps and flours are well integrated. Whisk the egg until slightly frothy, and mix in the combined flours and whisked cheese just until a soft dough in formed; do not over work the dough. Divide the dough into four equal pieces and shape into rounds (cakes). Place a piece of parchment on a baking sheet and lightly spray with oil. Place the bay leaves on the sheet and

set a dough round on each. Cover the rounds with an oven safe bowl (metal or glass) or deep casserole

dish. [The Romans often cooked with earthenware cover called a testo.] Bake for about 35-40 minutes until cakes are golden brown; check cakes at 30 minutes and remove cover if not browning. Remove the cakes from oven and remove leaves, and while still warm, place them into

a dish with the honey that has been warmed until fairly thin. Spoon honey over cakes or turn to coat. Leave cakes

in the honey for about 30 minutes, covered; all honey should be absorbed.

Pear Patina

The Romans were fond of their sweets, so more than one treat is always nice. The Libum and this patina make for a great dessert course, or what Romans called mensa secunda ("second meal"). This unique dessert is best served warm.

Time: 1h (20 minutes active)
Serves 4

4 pears

1 tablespoon raisins

White wine (to poach the pears)

1½ tablespoons honey

½ teaspoon pepper

½ teaspoon cumin

½ cup Vin Santo (Italian dessert

wine)

3 large eggs

1 cup whole milk

1 tablespoon extra virgin olive oil

Poach whole, rinsed pears in white wine until they easily yield to a knife (30-45 minutes). Add raisins to poaching liquid about 10 minutes before pears are done. Remove pears and raisins; crush raisins into a fine puree; peel and core pears and crush into a coarse puree. May be done separately in a food processor, but pulse so as not to over-process and make too smooth. Mix in the honey, pepper, cumin, and dessert wine. Beat the eggs until frothy, and add to pear mixture along with the milk and the olive oil. Pour into a casserole and bake at 350°F for about 20 minutes. May also be baked in individual serving dishes, adjusting time as needed.
