Unfortunately, there are times when we need to call 911 in order to receive emergency medical treatment. The following is information that you should know in order to ensure a quick response by emergency personnel, as well as proper care for you or your loved one:

When dialing 911, you will be asked these seven questions:

- 1. Your name
- 2. Your address
- 3. Your township
- 4. Your telephone number
- 5. The cross-street
 - a. Mill Road only for Springton, Newbury, and Eaton villages
 - b. Hershey's Drive only for Westbrook Village
 - c. Mill Road or Chandler Drive for Kennett and Franklin villages
 - d. Chandler Drive only for all other villages and for HM amenities

> When emergency personnel arrive, be ready to provide the six pieces of information below:

1. Patient's medical history (stroke, cardiac arrest, diabetes, etc.)

- 2. Patient's current medications
- 3. Patient's allergies
- 4. Copy of the patient's Living Will (if applicable)

- 6. Type of emergency (what is wrong?)
- 7. Age of the patient

Important: The emergency responders rely on the patient's feedback in order to administer the proper treatment; and may ask if you can walk to

We highly recommend making a list, or multiple lists for multiple locations, containing answers to all of the questions listed above; and keep that list

What You Need To Know If Calling 911

the stretcher or ambulance. If you feel at any time that movement or walking will cause you discomfort or pain, explain to the emergency responders that you prefer not to walk and wish to be moved or lifted onto the stretcher or into the ambulance.







Living in Pennsylvania was never on Sandra (Sandy) Wollenberg's bucket list, but what a great addition she is to Hershey's Mill. She moved here from Arizona almost three years ago to be near her daughter and family who live in Havertown.

Sandra grew up in Plymouth, a small town in central Connecticut, with her parents and a younger sister. She graduated from Terryville

High School in Terryville, Connecticut, and went on to attend Nazareth College near Rochester, New York.

A self-proclaimed "hippie", teen Sandy hitchhiked one winter from New York to Chicago, which was being engulfed in a huge blizzard, to see her boyfriend Carl. He was training with the Air Force to go to Vietnam. She made it to the train station in Chicago, but never got any farther. The storm was so bad that she was snowed in and had to return home without seeing Carl. However, she planned on seeing him later at the end of the school year to say goodbye; as she was planning to hitchhike to Haight-Ashbury in San Francisco. However, life took an unexpected turn

when she saw Carl, and to her surprise, he proposed. He was planning to go to Charleston, South Carolina, for more military training and wanted her to accompany him there as his wife. Nineteen-year-old Sandy said "yes" and they eloped.

They started out simply, as many couples do. They furnished their apartment with lawn furniture, and hung sheets for drapes. Unbeknownst to them, the apartment was infested with fire ants. Sandy was bitten by one of the ants and felt burning in her ears before passing out. After a few days spent in the hospital, she found out that she was allergic to fire ants.

Carl was deployed to Vietnam for four years where he worked as a weatherman; monitoring weather for the



troops. Sandy went back to Connecticut to live with her parents. She helped her mom at her office, but knew that kind of work was not

her calling. When Carl returned from Vietnam, he got a job at Pratt-Whitney as a draftsman and took engineering courses at night. Sandy also went to night school, but still wasn't sure what her true calling was.

Sandy was expecting their first child when she and Carl bought their first home; an original Sears Home ordered from the catalog. Her husband told her "you can have this baby any day but May 19" – which was moving day. On the night of May 18, she began having contractions. She headed to the hospi-

married, they bought and refurbished six houses. They moved several times, finally settling in Massachusetts. Sandy remembers that for the down payment of one of their houses they sold a babyblue 1964 Ford Mustang.

After moving to Massachusetts, Sandy took a job working "mother's hours" in a nursing home. This started her on the path to becoming a nurse practitioner. She enjoyed working with and helping older people, and felt that she had finally found her true calling. She started looking into nursing programs

tal and Carl handled the move. Later, his brothers took over so that he could be with her at the hospital. Their oldest daughter Brooke was born that day, followed by second daughter Kristen two-and-a-half years later, and finally, son Jared a year-and-a-half after that. Brooke now lives in Havertown with her husband and two children, and works for the University of Pennsylvania. Her husband frequently travels for his job, and Sandy enjoys helping out with the grandchildren. Daughter Kristen lives in Maine with her husband, who is a dentist, and their two children. Sandy's son Jared is single, and lives in San Diego.

When the children were young, Sandy worked on refurbishing their home; and also worked at various part-time jobs. In the 28 years that she and Carl were

education in school, Sandy wanted her children to have a well-rounded life with many enriching experiences. They enjoyed piano lessons, horseback riding, and many other fun activities. Sandy feels this is part of her "hippie" philosophy – you get to choose or mold your own life through your experiences. She also believes that life is a journey and everything that happens is happening for a reason.

After the children were grown, Sandy and her husband took a trip to Arizona. They got off the highway, drove through the countryside, and fell in love with the area. They were awed by the vast desert, the cacti, and the plateaus and mountains studded with pine trees. Sandy was enthralled by the beauty of the area and felt that she had come home; even though she had never been there before. She particularly liked Sedona and its rock forma-

stop the car so that she could go in. It was a large store, but she felt drawn to a display case which held a moldavite gem. Sandy has had many jobs over the years, and has helped and cared for many people. Patients have said to her "you are like an angel that came into my life." She has been involved in the care, treatment, and education of patients and families for over 40 years.

Besides traditional medicine, Sandy has long been a proponent of alternative treatment to promote prevention and self-healing. She currently lectures and teaches about health obtained from meditating has become her purpose in life: to heal others and learn about love. 

Many people haven't heard about the Yellow Dot Program, and some have but don't know how it works. This free Pennsylvania program is statewide and

I discovered the program through a flyer I received from State Representative Dan Truitt, and below are some program details like the ones he provided, and as shown in program promotional materials.

Provide Emergency Care Information If In A Car Crash

provides important information to emergency responders when you are in a car crash and incapacitated. This program strikes me as a

very practical idea, so I thought I would make sure everyone at the Mill hears about it, and share some details about what it does for you and how to sign up.

It's an ongoing program with no deadlines, so you can sign up whenever it is convenient. I requested my kit at www. YellowDot.pa.gov, and it was very straightforward (and took less than two minutes). The kit arrived in about ten days, I spent a

few minutes filling it out, and the yellow dot decal is now installed on the rear window of my car (with the accompanying medical and contact information booklet in my glove compartment).

Yellow Dot Program was created to assist citizens in the "golden hour" of emergency care following a traffic crash when they may not be able to communicate for themselves. Placing the yellow dot decal in your vehicle's

rear window alerts first responders to check your glove compartment for vital information. This will ensure that you receive the critical medical attention you need even when you are unable to provide it.

The program is a cooperative effort among the Pennsylvania Depart-

ments of Transportation, Health and Aging; the Pennsylvania State Police; the Pennsylvania Turnpike Commission; and both first responders and local law enforcement.

The yellow dot decal provided in the kit is placed in the lower left corner of the vehicle's rear window. There are instructions for placement, but the top of the sticker should be no higher than





Do you love dogs or do you love cats? Maybe you care for both, or neither; although the mental benefits associated with a four-legged friend should make you think again if you fall into the second group! In our case, Jack and I love dogs and have had three Black Labradors. So naturally, the name Four Dogs Tavern appealed to us. When we traveled in Europe, it was always so heartwarming to see that dogs were allowed in restaurants, and all of them

Across the way, a large stable was built to house animals of travelers. Almost 200 years later the vintage stable was converted into a restaurant named the Oyster Bar, and in 1996, it became the Four Dogs Tavern. It was named for a painting, by Louis Godefroy Jadin of France, of four foxhounds; a print of which hangs just inside the entrance.

We went on a beautiful Tuesday evening, and by 6:30pm the place was packed; both inside and on the lovely patio that was filled with flowers and ornamental shrubbery. The menu is

were so well behaved. It is rare in the United States to allow dogs in eating places. However, the Four Dogs Tavern does permit dogs in their huge outdoor patio; which seats at least 150 people. The evening that we were there, there was a long line of people waiting to be seated, but sadly for us, few dogs.

The Tavern is located in the village of Marshallton, originally a Quaker settlement founded in the 1760s. The surrounding agricultural community thrived because of its location along Strasburg Road, which had become the main route between Philadelphia and Lancaster. The village also thrived as it was a prime location for industries such as wheelwrighting, blacksmithing, cooping, and milling. And for the people, they could also find a cigar shop, shoe maker, tin smith, and barber.

The Marshalton Inn (note the difference in spelling due to an error on a deed) was built in 1793. It is an early example of Federal style architecture.

extensive, and challenges you to be a little adventuresome. Categories are fondues, cheese flights, charcuterie boards, snacks, flatbreads, soups, salads, shared plates, main courses, sandwiches, and chef's features. Wow, talk about choices! You really need to come with a big appetite too as the

portions are generous. The menu is the same for both lunch and dinner.

Due to the extensive menu, I will only be mentioning a few categories and dishes. Let's start with the fondue, which is very unusual these days for a restaurant that doesn't specialize in it. Ingredients are an artisan blend of Swiss and French cheeses, or Vermont cheddar. Accompaniments cost extra and include bratwurst, Asian pear, chorizo, and apple.

in our "Four Dogs doggie bag". Entree choices I noted were the crispy chicken with Gruyere whipped polenta (a diner favorite we were told); beef filet with au gratin potatoes; house made gnocchi; fish and chips; local longhorn meatloaf; rigatoni Bolognese; and fish tacos with

include six choices, and are served with blueberry marmalade and crackers. There is also a nice choice of flatbreads. Jack and I shared one, and it would be enough for dinner for one person. Our choice was melting Fontina with arugula and white truffle vinaigrette, and it was delicious! Others include Kennett mushrooms and goat cheese, and grilled Margherita with a five cheese blend and prosciutto. The crust is excellent.

If you can still find room to eat all of your main course after eating any of the five starters, you certainly have a bigger appetite than we do. We ate only part of our flatbread, and ate most but not all of our main courses. There were definitely leftovers of both to bring home

avocado, chipotle, Pico de Gallo, and cabbage. To check out their extensive menu for yourself, visit their website at thefourdogstavern.com.

Chef and owner David Cox is a West Chester native. He has traveled extensively and spent time working in many five-star hotels; eventually becoming sous chef at the Waldorf-Astoria. He also learned to master French cooking techniques when working with an esteemed French chef. His experience shows in all of the sauces and gravies that are house made. The cuisine at the restaurant seems to be mainly American, with seafood being accented.

The Four Dogs Tavern is open Monday through Thursday from 11:30am to midnight, Friday and Saturday from 11:30am to 1:30am, and Sunday from 11:30am to 11pm. If weather permits, the patio will still be open this month for you to give them a try. So leash up your doggie, and prepare for a very satisfying repast.

Windows 10 Free Update Ended and Security Update Ending Dates For Older Versions

Windows 10 was available as a free download for existing Windows 7 and 8 computers from July 29, 2015, until July 29, 2016. You had an entire year to perform this free upgrade. Yes, you had to put up with nags from Microsoft to permit the upgrade, but all in all I think it was worth it. Of course, some of you decided not to do the upgrade; and there were even some who decided not to do it but got it anyway through Microsoft's aggressive and confusing prompts. If you did upgrade, you have no choice but to receive continued updates from them. If you didn't, you are still covered by Microsoft with monthly security updates as follows: for Windows 7 this coverage ends on January 14, 2020; for Windows 8 it ends on January 10, 2023; and for Windows Vista it ends on April 11, 2017. For those that may still be using Windows



XP, you should be aware that security updates ended over two years ago – and that could be a concern for you!



Windows 10 Anniversary Update

For Windows 10 users Microsoft has started rolling out a technical update already. It began on August 2 of this year, but it is being rolled out very slowly. This contains very few major changes that the user will see in Windows 10 as it is mostly for fixing bugs and increasing stability. One of the visual changes, though, is to the Desktop screen; and in the Task Bar the time and date will switch places with the Action Center. Also, when you click the 4-pane white icon (Start menu) on the left of the Task Bar, the All apps list will automatically show instead of having to click that as well. Lastly, to shut the computer down or to restart it, click the Start icon, move the mouse to the Power icon (just above it), click it to see Shut down or Restart, and then make your choice with a click. This update, referred to formally as the Anniversary update (version 1607), does not affect any of your programs, email, files and pictures, etc. As noted before, Windows 10 users cannot option out of any Microsoft updates.

Recheck Your Windows 10 Privacy Settings After Updates

When Microsoft issues updates, it's a good idea to recheck your privacy settings. If you aren't sure whether an update occurred or not, you can find out at the monthly PC





Club meetings. Why a need to recheck? You would think that once you have made your privacy settings initially that you are done – but that's not so. Microsoft often turns some to other states from

what you had them at, so "on" can become "off" as well as the reverse! To read more about Windows 10 privacy settings, you can read my prior article (similar to the *Guide and Digest* version) by visiting www.hersheysmill. org and entering "tech tips privacy" in the Search box. To check your privacy, click Settings, and then Privacy. If you use Cortana, Microsoft's digital voice assistant, you need to allow your microphone to operate; and under Speech, inking and typing, I suggest you set it to "Stop getting to know me".



Joe Kennedy | Princeton

During his career as a painter, from the late 19th through the early 20th century, George Cope stayed close to home, seeking neither fame nor fortune. Yet during good times and bad, he remained true to his art. "Being an

artist calls for a lot of uphill work, but the extreme pleasure it gives one to portray the beauties of nature makes up for all that," Cope said.



In 1883 he married Theodosia Blair of Chester County, and they had a daughter. Cope established a stu-

dio in West Chester where he painted realistic style landscapes, sporting scenes, barns, homes, Quaker meeting places, and bridges (including "Cope's Bridge" in 1897 and "Brandywine Landscape" in 1900). Although most of his paintings depict the

In 1905, Cope began to receive local

commissions to paint still-lifes. These

paintings included bright colors

against a dark background, and show-

ing people's prized possessions such as

that the market for his work, which had been limited to the West Chester area, had dried up. This left Cope penniless. Yet he still painted on, adding a bit of impressionism to his style.

> Cope made a living by selling garden vegetables door-todoor, and bartering his paintings for goods, food, and professional services locally. His physician, Henry Pleasant, acquired a large collection of Cope's

Painter George Cope

Cope was born in 1855 into a Quaker family in East Bradford. As a youth, he spent a great deal of time out of doors hunting, fishing, and sketching the

rural world around West Chester. It was during this period that he decided he wanted to be an artist. But his parents sent him to West Chester Normal School to be educated as a teacher. He never graduated.

In 1876, at the age of 21, he met artist Herman Herzog at the Centennial celebration in Philadelphia. Herzog, a German-born landscape painter, encouraged him to follow a career in art and soon became his mentor. Cope never studied painting formally,

West Chester area, he did paint a few remarkable landscapes of the Pocono Mountains; including the Delaware Water Gap area.



a vase, silver pieces, china, or books. Cope also painted in the *trompe l'oeil*, or "fool the eye", style; and an example of this is his "Hunter's Paraphernalia" of 1887. The painting shows hunting gear, hat, vest, rope, and shotgun hung on an antler rack against an oak door.

In 1917, when America entered World War I, Cope, at the age of 62, began to work on a farm as

part of a wartime home-front effort. This meant a reduced income because he was not receiving commissions. When the war ended and he resumed his regular painting schedule, he found

paintings. Cope died in 1929, and was buried in the Oakland Friends Cemetery in West Chester. Today, much of his work remains in the

hands of private local collectors, or in the collections of institutions such as the Chester County Historical Society, Art Institute of Chicago, and Schwarz Gallery of Philadelphia.

In 1992, I squandered a round of golf with a most interesting and thoughtful man, Charles Price. I was stupidly more interested with trying to play well in front of him than I was focused on the man himself and what I could learn from him.

Charles Price (1926 to 1994) was one of the preeminent golf writers of his day, respected by other writers like Herbert

That day we played, I had some knowledge of him, having read a few of his pieces, but no real insight. Evidently, Price was a good amateur player, and had played on the Tour for a time. When I met him, I knew he was failing, and the end came just two years later. As I recall, he played in a dress shirt, sleeves rolled up, and having removed his tie. Later, I found that seasoned golfers who knew him in his playing days thought he had a "nice swing". What I saw was remnants of a former player.

Maximum distance results from somewhat less than maximum effort. Swinging the club at 80% effort encourages many positive things to happen during the swing. Some of those are proper balance, better weight shift, proper sequence, less tension, and ultimately better contact. Another benefit that is usually over looked is our equipment. The properties of torque and flex built into today's driver shafts perform best when the club isn't being swung as hard, or as violently, as possible.
