Message from the President

Holidays are usually fun, and this year, for a change, we were treated to beautiful weather for the Memorial Day weekend. Memorial Day became a national holiday in 1971. Unfortunately, sometimes the meaning behind the holiday gets lost as we often forget what we are supposed to remember. The purpose was and is to reflect and honor those who died in the service of their country. Hopefully, somewhere during these days, between your hamburger and beer, you managed to say a prayer and offer a "Thank You" to the brave men and women who gave their all for the cause of freedom.

After many months, the Hershey's Mill Community Center will reopen its doors to the residents of the Mill in June. All activities will resume on Monday, June 11 at their regularly scheduled times. The library will open at 10 am on June 11th. I recently forwarded an invitation from the Board of the Master Association to all residents of the Mill to tour the refurbished facility on Thursday, June 7th from 10 am to 3 pm or on Friday, June 8th from 10 am to 2 pm. As I mentioned in the March Newsletter, I had an opportunity to tour the Community Center during the refurbishment process and I think you will be happy and proud of the new look of the facility. Please take the opportunity to see what some of your dues have accomplished.

Another item that has been mentioned in the past was the development of a new Hershey's Mill website to be focused on the continued marketing of the Mill. Rhoads Creative was selected to be the designer/developer of this website with a special emphasis on Search Engine Optimization. SEO relates to the methodology that gets a site listed on the first page of a response to a search performed on a search engine such as Google. Ultimately, being listed on the first page of a search response is the objective of every site that is available on the web.

While there are still a number of items that require cleanup, the site is now running and can be viewed at www.hersheysmill55plus.com. Feel free to visit the site and give me your thoughts. Remember it is still a work in progress and there are still a number of items that require cleanup – like the right pictures for the verbiage and connections to sites showing any Hershey's Mill property currently on the market.

As I stated in last month's newsletter, Council would meet to discuss and address a number of unfunded village projects to establish an approach to them in terms of both timing and funding. This took place during our last meeting on May 23rd. You may recall that some of these issues were raised at the Village town meeting held on April 25th. Based on these discussions and review of our findings, Council has approved funding certain items for action in CY2012 from a portion of the excess budgeted snow removal funds of \$48,000 projected for this calendar year. The total of these expenditures of approximately \$23,000, will leave approximately \$25,000 to cover potential year-end snow removal costs and also cover a negative operating budget carryover from CY 2011 of \$7,500.

Approved projects include contracting with a professional company in CY 2012 to review and generate a current capital replacement cost for common village items, the most substantial of which are roofs, roadways, walkways and driveways.

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Council and Committee Members

This type of study was last conducted in 2008/09 and the results serve as the basis of our annual budget for capital reserve requirements.

It is imperative that we conduct this type of study on a recurring basis, in order to insure that our capital reserves are sufficient to meet future needs.

Council also approved contracting with Jarman Electric in CY 2012 to conduct Smoke Alarm cleaning and testing and battery replacement where necessary. This action was previously taken in CY 2006 and it was deemed necessary to do so again.

Council has also approved requesting the Xtreme Company to check all homes to identify the need to do chimney cap rehab, roof pipe boot repair/replacement and attic fan rehab. The first two items will be at the Home Owner Association expense while the attic fan rehab will be offered to the specific residents at a projected cost of \$35 per homeowner. Assuming the cost of this action is within our budget constraints these actions will also be approved for implementation in CY 2012. Don't be alarmed if you find people from this company ascending your roof tops within the next two weeks.

Driveway sealant which was last applied in CY 2010 will be considered for inclusion in the CY 2013 budget. Also to be considered for inclusion in the CY 2013 budget will be an exterior stucco moisture probe on a statistical sample basis of village homes by a professional organization to be selected by Council in CY 2012. This was deemed necessary since our extended warranty on the exterior masonry stone and stucco from KHovnanian will expire on April 20, 2014. A request for a roof cleaning project was rejected by Council on a cost basis as well as a lack of any evidence as to its value and the possibility of its potential damage.

Programs for shutter renewal and garage painting Throughout the village were not deemed necessary at this time and will be reviewed for future implementation as the need becomes more apparent.

During our last Yardley Village Council meeting, Mary Ellen Marra, Chairperson of the Landscape Committee, made an impassioned plea for one last try to get people to trim their plantings around their mailboxes. As you may or may not know, residents are required by the USPS to exhibit visible house numbers on their mailboxes. While such numbers are affixed to each mailbox within Yardley Village, there are numerous cases where residents have planted flowers, vines, etc., that have now grown to the point where they cover some of the numbers and obstruct the full address.

I am requesting, in my most gentle and polite, neighborly, friendly, cordial, courteous, kindly, considerate manner that each of you take a moment with clippers in hand to visit your mailbox within the next week and clip any offshoots of plantings from the vicinity of your house numbers. Don't be afraid, the plants will grow back and I will be writing this again. If this does not occur as requested, I will have to revert to my normal nature and then it's "No More Mr. Nice Guy".

Landscape Committee

June has arrived with lush green lawns and abundance of color that has been popping out since Easter. Hopefully, the abundant precipitation will replenish the water table for future needs.

Three important items call to your attention:

- 1. **HMLD** has advised us that yellow to brown discoloration along needle and tips of White Pine were the result of environmental stress due to warm weather followed by freeze up to 2 months ago. New growth on tips is visible and we think all is well.
- 2. **MOSQUITOES**: This nuisance insect is actually important to the food chain, providing sustenance to fish, birds, frogs, spiders, and other insects.

Environmental conditions determine how abundant these creatures will be in any given season. Since different species of mosquitoes are present and bite humans day or night, Bruce Foreacre, HMLD environmental specialist, has already sprayed all susceptible areas of The Mill where there are no natural enemies of this insect. This is important to us since the mosquito is considered by many as the most important insect in the world as far as disease transmission. Bruce advises that HMLD monitor and spray as needed to help prevent and control outbreaks. Only products containing DEET are a helpful preventative especially sprayed on clothes rather than skin where appropriate. Anti-steroidal cream can be used to treat the itch, depending on the individual. Scratching might open a bite and risk infection. Please be watchful of ticks and mosquitoes and take appropriate action. HOMEOWNERS can help by removing any unused and/or used flower pots, pot saucers, bird baths, hose containers or any places where standing water can collect.

- 3. **POSTAL REGULATIONS**: Mailbox numbers must be visible on both sides of the mailbox post. The responsibility to monitor and keep these numbers visible belongs to the homeowner and will no longer be monitored by landscape committee members. The efforts by most homeowners to keep these numbers visible is noted and appreciated. If your neighbor has not supported an existing vine, or, not cleared the numbers, and is unable to do so, perhaps you could offer to help or just call it to their attention. If assistance is needed please call on a committee member and we will try to help.
- 4. On a clear day, take a walk or a ride and enjoy the beautiful village and The Mill that you call home.
