Message from the President

The 4th of July always reminds me of my mother-inlaw. I know that sounds strange but she was born on the 4th of July which was very apropos for such an independent and lively women. Being a holiday, we were always available and able to celebrate her birthday on the 4th. With a little effort, she managed to convince my children that the fireworks and parades were for her birthday. Each of them in turn, helped to keep the myth alive until each of them, in turn, were able to figure out the con job. On the other hand, she was also able to convince them that she was a stripper in her younger days. This took a lot of "proof" but she was able to pull it off for a lot longer than the birthday fireworks.

She had the most gregarious personality possible and was able to make friends in the check out line at the supermarket. It was hard not to like her and she connected with people from the youngest to the oldest. I recall one incident, driving home from the Jersey Shore, when she suggested we stop at a particular gas station, which I did. Minutes later the Pakistani gas attendant and she were hugging like long lost relatives.

We lost her at the age of 81, after about a year suffering from Alzheimers. In fact, she did not suffer; we did because we watched her disappear. My biggest regret is that only one of her greatgrandchildren was able to know her. She is gone physically, but as you can see, she is still alive and well in our memories, particularly on the 4th of July.

The Xtreme Company completed its inspection of the chimney caps, roof pipe boots and attic exhaust fan covers existing on all the Yardley homes. This resulted in a need to scrape/sand and clean 152 of a total of 195 chimney caps and vents with 43 having been remediated in recent years. The process includes cleaning with phosphoric cleaner and the application of industrial alkyd marine primer and black latex top coat. Due to the cost (\$205 per chimney) associated with the number of units involved, it was decided to address 76 of the worst units this calendar year and the remaining 76 units next year.

In addition, 51 exhaust fan covers were recommended for similar maintenance. Since these fans were installed as an option, the cost (\$35 per fan cover) of such maintenance is at the homeowner's expense. You have been notified by email if your home is on this list and have been requested to notify CSK Management. (Janet Burgess) by mail or email of your acceptance or rejection of this work effort. Please insure that you respond to this request directly to CSK Management by July 15, 2012.

The third item inspected was the PVC vent pipe rubber collar and flange, and there were a total of 11 units that require replacement.

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As you are aware, the chimney cap and PVC rehab will be paid for by the Homeowners Association. I will be forwarding by email, in the near future, a list of the village unit addresses with a number of the specific requirements per home.

Also, Jarman Electric will begin testing and cleaning smoke/security alarm units in the July & August timeframe. Since this will require entrance to your home, we will advise you of the dates and the process that will be followed in order to implement this activity.

I had previously mentioned in last month's newsletter, that a village garage door painting program would not be implemented at this time. This decision will be reviewed by council for future implementation as the overall need becomes more apparent. In the meantime, if residents choose to have their door painted prior to this action, it will be at their expense and they must conform to the approved Yardley Village color.

Hopefully, you have been able to visit the Hershey's Mill Community Center since it reopened in June. You should also recognize that a significant amount of costs were involved with replacing the existing, outdated and tired Heating & A/C system, removing and replacing all single pane windows and installing all new attic and wall insulation and siding. While, very little of this action is visible it certainly will result in more efficient heating and cooling and reduce ongoing power cost. What are immediately

visible are the removal of misplaced and overgrown trees on the front parking lot and the wide open appearance of the improved landscaping. Once inside the front door of the building, you will be greeted by a wide open stairway leading to the great hall. The "expansive" library and billiard room/game room/TV room are also worth visiting.

It is interesting to note that the number one complaint and disappointment I heard from most of the Hershey's Mill residents who have visited was the absence of, if you'll pardon the expression, an elevator.

I must admit that it was something that, probably, should have been considered, priced and submitted to the Hershey's Mill residents as a stand alone question as an adjunct to the final refurbishment plan. Maybe it's not too late.
