



We were saddened to learn Mr. Woolridge passed away at his home in Clear Lake, California. He is the real estate developer who made Hershey's Mill successful. Bob came to Pennsylvania in 1982 at the request of the then Fidelity Bank. He assumed responsibility for the Bank's troubled asset, Hershey's Mill, that had two completed villages, Ashton and Brighton, and two that were partially completed, Chatham and Devonshire. There was a mountain of debt and a host of problems, and Bob went to work bringing in a whole new construction

team, but keeping most of the club, office, and support staff. Within a few years, he had turned around the asset such that the Bank was forced to sell Hershey's Mill to Bob's company – and the rest is history.

Our condolences go out to his wife Clarita and his children Berto, Heather and Robyn.

QUESTION: Why can't the woodshop build a decent enclosure for the dumpster across from Jefferson? It is an eyesore.

ANSWER: The Woodshop would very much like to enclose the dumpster, but such a move would not be practical. If a wooden barrier was built it would have to encroach on a muchneeded Woodshop parking space and it would require two doors for access by a dump truck. However, as with any enclosed dumpster location, the doors are usually left open and, more importantly, dumpster trucks invariably back into the doors and their support posts rendering them unable to close or fully close.

A practical alternative would be to paint the dumpster green to blend in with the surrounding grass. However, since neither the Woodshop nor Hershey's Mill owns the dumpster, permission would be required from the owner which most likely is the current Hershey's Mill trash service provider.

QUESTION: What exactly are the duties that the individual guards are responsible to perform? The resident was told that the reason two guards had to be on duty all night is because when one has to answer a call that leaves one at the guardhouse. Since the guards can't do anything when answering a call why do they bother responding? The fire department doesn't need an escort since they are very familiar with location of all the villages?

ANSWER: We have two officers on for numerous reasons. The primary purposes of Security are:

- 1. Monitor vehicular access to the community.
- 2. Serve as a communications center (alarms, resident concerns, etc.).
- 3. Serve as a deterrent by providing the most visible implication of Security possible

Security officers are all First Aid certified and AED certified. In normal times, they respond to all calls, enter the home and assess the situation. If a resident is in cardiac arrest, they will

use the AED to attempt resuscitation. Otherwise, they will gather information, medications, etc. to assist the ambulance personnel when they arrive.

When not being summoned to calls, the second officer is charged with patrolling the community twice each shift including going through villages, sitting at the remote gates to "be a presence" and checking on and securing Master

Association facilities. We have found each spring and summer as school lets out, local area kids and teenagers create some measure of "mischief" and our patrolling officers frequently find, confront and escort such younger persons from the property.



QUESTION: Is the Golf Club going to offer discounts on the membership fees and amenities that members were not able to use during the COVID-19 virus?

ANSWER: (Thanks to Scott Martin of the Hershey's Mill Golf Club for providing this answer.)
At the time of this writing, late April, we have not discussed any discounts. We



were perfectly willing and qualified, under the circumstances, to break the six-foot barrier in order to provide insight into the life of a professional baseball player.




She asked: How/when were vou introduced to baseball?

His response: There were scouts from various teams always prowling around the high school and college games. If they saw a prospect, that boy was sent an invitation to tryout. In my case, I was offered tryouts with the NY Giants, the Phillies, and the Red Sox. The Sox offered me the most money and a chance to play in the majors after I proved myself in the minors.

She asked: What other notable players were on your Red Sox team? **His response:** Carl Yastrzemski, who was my roommate and godfather of

She asked: How did you handle the fame and recognition of playing major league baseball?



Old Wines

We consider wines "old" when they were made more than ten years ago, but there are some that are a hundred or more years old.

Nearly 99% of all wines are consumed within five years, when they are fine, fresh and alert. Only few wines get better when they are older, mainly red ones and some sweet white wines.

The Romans aged their Falernian wines for decades, and in the book of Luke from the Bible, scripture says "no one after drinking old wine desires new, for he says: The old is good." (Luke 5:39)

The wines with the best chance of getting better with age are for the red ones Bordeaux, Burgundy, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Nebbiolo, and for the white Riesling and Chenin Blanc. Fortified and naturally sweet wines are good seemingly forever. In a recent tasting, a 1795 Madeira was judged excellent.

The Portuguese developed the Solera system: Every year as needed, new wine is added to a barrel of old to "refresh" it, so there is always a blend of old and new wines. There is some Solera wine that was started in 1870!

Old bottles should have a cork and be stored at a temperature below 69 degrees Fahrenheit in a dark, humid, and tranquil room. When taken out, the color should still be clear and attractive, and the level still be high.

Old wines need to stand upright for some hours and then be decanted to get rid of the sediments and to let them breath before being enjoyed. Always sample before you serve!

You pay a higher price for old wines. The only ones found under \$20 are the Spanish Rioja Grand Reserves that are terribly overlooked. They are made from the Tempranillo grape, either alone or blended, and aged in oak barrels for several years before release.

Because old wines are relatively expensive, they are a big temptation for fraud. In 2014, a Californian dealer had to pay back more than \$28 million in restitution to his victims.

There are still thousands of bottles with wrong years on the market, and it is often difficult to recognize them, even for professionals. If you have a question, go to WineFraud.com. A friend of mine who is an authority may be reached on Vieuxvins@yahoo.co.uk.

But do not be afraid: Try some Rioja Grand Reserve or, if you can afford it, an old Bordeaux or Burgundy. And be prepared to fall in love.

Martha Washington

During the American Revolution, George Washington's wife, Martha, spent the warm months of the year, while her husband was with the army, overseeing activities at their estate, Mount Vernon. But when the army went into winter quarters, Martha joined her husband. Thus it was that Martha Washington arrived at Valley Forge in February 1778 to join George. At the time the soldiers had suffered from shortages of food, medicine and poor shelter. "The army was on the point of dissolution."

But the appointment of Gen. Nathaniel Greene as Quartermaster General had done much to alleviate shortages in provisions for the army. "Officers and men live in hutts [sic] and the army is as healthy as can be expected," Martha wrote. Martha, however, did not live in a "hutt". She shared a bedroom with her husband in the Isaac Potts farmhouse; the army headquarters where the staff officers lived and worked. To provide more room, Gen. Washington had a log cabin built next to the house to be used as a dining area for his wife and staff officers.

Martha's arrival seems to have cheered George up a great deal. She planned a party for his 46th birthday and was the hostess in charge of the dinner that was attended by staff officers and their wives. And it appears that, each morning, Martha gathered these wives together for a chatty session of sewing and knitting.

Contemporary accounts describe Martha as short and plump with an

agreeable manner that put both men and women at ease. Martha was nearly 47 when she came to Valley Forge with a history of fear of travel and strange places. The trip from Virginia to Pennsylvania by horse-drawn coach must have been cold and uncomfortable. And Valley Forge was hardly a winter resort. This speaks to her personal courage and devotion to her husband.

The conjecture about her role at Valley Forge began in the 19th century with stories of Martha carrying a basket of socks, garments and food, moving from one hospital site to another, distributing gifts to the sick soldiers. Another story has her praying for a dying sergeant. These stories were elevated from legend to acceptance of truth in the 20th century. It was an attempt to create a picture of what good women did during the winter encampment.

Martha and the wives of other officers are portrayed as genteel "angels of mercy patching uniforms, knitting scarves, darning stockings and preparing baskets of food and medicine for the soldiers".

Martha Dandridge, the future Martha Washington, was born in 1731 into polite society in Kent County, Virginia. By age 18 she was considered attractive and capable. She married Daniel Custis in 1749. Custis was a wealthy planter and the couple had four children, two of whom died in infancy. When Martha was 26, her husband died, leaving her a wealthy widow with two children. Her fortune gave her a



wide field of suitors but after just two visits from George Washington, he proposed marriage and was accepted.

They were married in 1759 and moved to Mount Vernon. With Martha's money, he rebuilt his home and increased his farm holdings, which made it into a prosperous plantation. The marriage worked. She was a cheerful, good-natured companion,

and he a devoted husband and a good stepfather to her daughter and son.

At the end of the war, Washington returned to Virginia and Martha. He resumed the lifestyle of family man and planter. Martha played hostess to an endless line of visitors seeking George's advice on politics and economics.

When Washington was elected president, Martha became the nation's initial First Lady and she set high standards for that position. As is often noted, Washington was "first in war, first in peace and first in the hearts of his countrymen". One would like to think that Martha was first in George's heart, too.

Martha died in 1802, three years after George, at age 71.

June is Alzheimer's Awareness Month

When you forget things that you believe you should have remembered, you sometimes make a joke that you are getting Alzheimer's. Well, forgetting is a part of aging and since the mission of Hershey's Mill is an active over 55 community, we all fall into that risk category. So how can we differentiate between normal aging and more serious health concerns?

Stress has an impact on our ability to remember. If you are not getting

enough sleep, feel anxious about something, or are feeling depressed, you may not be able to concentrate effectively and therefore will start to forget things. If you are taking medications that help manage an illness but may have the side effect of sedation or confusion, you may not be able to concentrate fully. When you start to forget and worry it may be something more, some of us use alcohol to relax but this may lead to forgetting. Sometimes, forgetfulness can result from having too many things to do at one time or having to many interruptions

Kitchen Exercises

Gabe Kresge, PT, DPT of Kinetic Physical Therapy was kind enough to share this information with us. As the COVID-19 crisis forces people to stay inside their homes, concerns over physical and mental health continue to grow. For those with conditions such as diabetes, heart disease and hypertension, reduction in activity level can exacerbate these conditions and lead to medical emergencies. Staying active during this uncertain time is crucial!

A few of the exercises that can be performed while at home, even while waiting for water to boil when cooking, are: Squats, Lunges, Heel raises, Stationary marching, Hamstring curls,

and/or Single-leg step-ups on the stairs. Alternatively, dancing to your favorite music, briskly walking around the house, and gardening/lawn work are great ways to work on your aerobic capacity.

Compared to being sedentary, moderate-intensity physical activity is associated with increased immune function. Likewise, regular physical activity is associated with lower levels of anxiety and perceived stress. The Physical Activity Guidelines for American's recommend 150-300 minutes of moderate-intensity aerobic activity per week, with 2 sessions of strength training. Every active minute counts, so fitting in 2, 5, 10 or 20 minutes every day is important.

which prevents full attention to the task at hand. So, when forgetting starts to bother you, try to relax and evaluate the concern. And most importantly, talk to your primary care provider about the concerns for yourself or loved one.

The word Dementia is a broad term for symptoms related to memory loss. Alzheimer's is a specific condition that has memory loss as one of the symptoms. As memory loss becomes disruptive to your life, you need to contact your PCP to discuss concerns. Sometimes other illnesses can contribute to memory loss. Be aware, that if you or your loved one has another health condition such as low functioning Thyroid, Depression, or Parkinson's disease, etc., you may experience memory impairment. But when you get help to managing these illnesses, you could experience a decrease in your memory loss symptoms.

Alzheimer's is a frightening condition for the family and the person. We all know it can slowly rob someone of their ability to take care of themselves. As the person goes through the stages, sometimes it is only someone close that recognizes the changes. Generally, the person starts to have difficulty with everyday tasks and needs more reminders to do things that have been easier to accomplish in the past. Sometimes this sneaks up on both the person and loved one and you have adjusted to the new experience with reminders on calendars because we have so many things to do and we all forget at times. But then, the loved one may start wondering why the person is starting to drink tea instead of making coffee, or has forgotten to make their usual breakfast, and said they are waiting for you. These are tasks that

seem simple but if you count all the steps involved, you can see why some things are changing because they may have become too complicated to accomplish. Remember, sometimes they want to change to tea instead of coffee but listen to your inner voice when you feel uncomfortable with the change in behavior.

Sometimes we are so afraid that a person or we may be developing Alzheimer's that we do not talk about our concerns. We need to understand that early intervention could have a positive impact on the trajectory of the illness.

Not only is your PCP a good resource but the Hershey's Mill Caregiver Support Group that meets on the first Thursday of the month can provide support and information.

PECO Electric Bill

Flectric Sub-Committee

Your electric bill from PECO contains two rates; a rate you pay for generation of electricity and a transmission rate that PECO charges for the use of their delivery infrastructure. Several years ago Pennsylvania allowed residents to switch their electricity generation supplier under a Program called PAPowerSwitch. This means that you can switch to any supplier that offers the lowest price, or provide a specific service you want, such as green energy. The idea was that competition would reduce such generation rates.

Many Hershey's Mill residents switched. For those using an Alternate Generation Supplier of electricity, it is very important to know the details of the contract, especially its expiration date and early Termination penalty, if any. Your PECO monthly statement shows your Generation Supplier and phone number. You should call your Generation Supplier directly and get the information if you don't already know it. Look up your annual usage on your statement.

When your contract expiration is near, you have many choices, each of which means you have to contact your Generation Supplier. Go to PAPowerSwitch website, www. papowerswitch.com, to see competitive offers. Pay specific attention to the rate PECO now offers. It is called the Rate To Compare ("RTC"). PECO is required to calculate the RTC every month applicable for the next three months. This website describes what you need to do to change suppliers or

choose to return to PECO at no fee. Remember PECO's rate fluctuates and needs PA approval. Another option is to renew with your supplier at published rates or you can always negotiate a new lower rate.

Be aware, if you do not do something at the end of your Alternate Generation Contract's term, your Contracted Supplier may automatically renew your contract at an exorbitant new rate and longer new term.

Note: You also can make an offer to your Supplier *now* before the end of term if you are paying more than the RTC. Typically you will need to extend your term.

PECO's rates have been trending down in recent months and are competitive *today*. Generation rates are everchanging. PECO has converted coal burning plants to natural gas which is abundant and cheap in PA. As of this writing, PECO has asked PA to allow them to close expensive nuclear plants. Environmentalists want them to remain open since they produce "clean" electricity. If the nuclear plants do not close, PECO's rates will go up.

SUMMARY:

The current RTC is \$0.065950.

Residents who have an alternate provider need to be diligent about managing their contract.

Residents who use our default provider, PECO, should periodically check the website for substantial savings.

Comcast Email-Spam

Many of us continued with Comcast email after the transition to Verizon. Using it has been satisfactory for the most part. However, Comcast's Spam filter, at best, is a lukewarm operation. Yes, it will filter out some Spam emails but for the most part it lets the bulk of those emails through to your Inbox.

Here's what you can do to beef up the filtering of Spam emails. First sign in to your Comcast email account as you usually do and open your Inbox. Next click the *gear* (Settings) on the far upper right of the page. Click Set*tings* in the drop down menu. Then click *Advance Settings* on the left. Scroll down to **Spam Filtering** and put check-marks in *Enable spam fil*tering and also Save a copy of emails marked as spam. Click Mail at the top left to return to your Inbox. You have now set up the Spam filter properly. Next is the procedure to train the Spam filter to work more aggressively in filtering out those annoying and repetitive Spam emails.

Looking at your Inbox emails, determine a Spam email and put a checkmark in the box at the far left of the


Spam email. You can usually tell Spam by whom it from or by the subject matter. At the top of the page click the icon that has an arrow pointing to the right, which is the *Move* icon. When the Move

window opens click *Spam*, then at the lower left click Create filter rule. The latter is the key to making the Spam filter work better. A message will appear at the bottom that says, "All future messages from the sender will be moved to the selected folder". Click the Move button. In the last window click the Save button.

Now you have to train the filter to make it work efficiently. I recommend that you continue through your Inbox emails clicking the Spam emails and by following the preceding procedure. It's best that you go back 4 weeks in time to get the best results.

After you go through the procedure you should find 90% of your Spam emails will not appear in your Inbox. As with any Spam filter it's best to review the Spam folder's content frequently for any good emails that may have ended up there.

The good news is that I have only done this procedure once through the previous 4 weeks of my emails. It seems that the majority of Spam emails are sent by just a few bulk e-mailers. I've only added a few single ones in a month's time.









Dominos at the Woodshop

People think of different things when they hear the word "dominos". Some think pizza, others remember a board game with rectangular playing pieces.

Woodworkers have their own take on dominos and it can be a game-changer. The Hershey's Mill Woodshop has owned a Festool Domino Joiner DF 500 for about two years, but it wasn't getting much attention. No one seemed to be an expert in its use. Then along came Woodshop member Gary Collins, who has progressed at the Woodshop from a novice woodworker to a craftsman making beautiful pieces of furniture. Recognizing its potential, Gary set about teaching himself how to use the Domino machine. Starting with the basics using online resources, Gary honed his expertise through

actual practice, building everything from wine racks and trays, through bookcases and end tables, culminating in a kitchen table and a writing desk! Gary is now an expert on Festool Domino Joiner.

Woodshop committee member Bob Coldwell, always looking for educational opportunities for woodshop members, noted Gary's mastery of the machine and asked if he would be willing to offer a class to share his knowledge with interested woodworkers. Gary was happy to help! Five woodworkers quickly signed up for Gary's first class held in late February. The small class size allowed valuable hands-on experience for all participants. Gary had a second class planned but was preempted by

COVID-19. He's looking forward to rescheduling as soon as social distancing is behind us.

What exactly was Gary teaching?

What value does the domino machine bring to woodworkers?

In short, the Festool machine is a joiner. It drills a flattened oval hole (mortise) that accepts a corresponding rectangular domino (tenon) that, with a little glue, secures the joint. There are lots of systems out there for joining pieces of wood, each with its pros and cons. According to Gary, the domino machine has two specific features that make it superior. First, because of the rectangular shape of the dominos and the corresponding insertion points, a more precise and stable joint is achieved. There is no

play at the joint as there can be with a biscuit system. Second, the domino joint is stronger. One anecdotal report of strength testing demonstrated the domino joint was stronger than even a screw-based Kreg system joint. Ease of use, though, is Gary's favorite feature of this system. In experienced hands, the same result can be achieved consistently in a fraction of the time as when using hand tools. In summary, the Festool Domino machine is efficient, it's fast, and results are precise and reliably reproduced.

As with all woodworking tools, training and experience are the keys to success. If you are a Woodshop member interested in learning how to take your wood joining to the next level, watch for Gary's next class when the Woodshop reopens.

CPR/AED/CHOKING CERTIFICATION Barbara Trimble | Ashton

"The American Heart Association and some hospitals are pushing to make lifesaving techniques easier and more convenient to learn. Choking kills about 5,000 Americans annually, while about 450,000 Americans die of cardiac arrest, mostly at home, work or in public rather than at a hospital. For both types of emergency, a bystander help can be the difference between life and death."

HMSG has been providing CPR/AED/ Choking classes for several years at reduced rates to residents of The Mill. We will be introducing another class sometime in the late summer or fall.

CPR Cardiopulmonary resuscitation is a **life-saving** technique that helps maintain blood flow to the brain

and heart in an emergency situation.

CPR Training can save your life, your children's lives, your partner's life or, a stranger's life.



Choking occurs when a foreign object lodges in the throat or windpipe blocking the flow of oxygen to the brain.

Choking Emergency Training provides lifesaving techniques and are easy to learn.

AED Automated external defibrillator is a portable electronic device that automatically diagnoses the life threatening heartbeat (or lack of) and can, by application of electricity, correct it. Being trained to use this device is an integral component of **CPR**.

What's an easily-made, portion-controlled, shareable treat with many delicious kinds? That would be cookies – if there was flour available to buy! But it turns out we can still buy cake mixes, so we're now making fantastic cookies from those. All recipes use 15.25 to 16-ounce boxed mixes (any brand), and we've used a variety of cake flavors. You likely have time for drop cookies now, but a bar recipe is provided as well. Low on eggs? We've got eggless. Have only unsalted butter? Use it, and add a bit of salt. Need to make other substitutions? Go for it! After all, substitutions are how we ended up with these. Enjoy cooking, eating, and sharing these, and be safe!

Cake-Mix Cookies

Triple Chocolate Cookies

Chocolate chip cookies for chocolate lovers! These drop cookies use mayonnaise instead of fresh eggs; which also provides the fat (oil). Makes 4 dozen.

- 1 box chocolate cake mix
- 2 boxes chocolate pudding mix
- 1¹/₄ cup mayonnaise (not reduced fat)
- 1 package semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans

Preheat oven to 350°F. Using an electric mixer, blend dry mixes and mayonnaise for 90 seconds, then stir in chips and nuts. On greased baking sheets, drop dough by tablespoonfuls about 2" apart. Bake until edges are barely set, 9-10 minutes, then remove and let cool 6 minutes on sheets (where cookies will continue to cook and firm), then remove to cooling rack.

Better Butter Cookies

These gooey cookies include cream cheese for rich flavor! Makes 3 dozen.

- 1 box white cake mix
- 1 package cream cheese
- 1 stick salted butter
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1 cup powdered sugar

Preheat oven to 350°F. Using an electric mixer, blend dry mix, softened cheese and butter, egg, and extract for 2 minutes, then roll dough into 1" balls. Roll

balls in bowl of sugar, then place 2" apart on ungreased baking sheets. Bake until centers are barely set, 10-11 minutes, then remove and let cool 1 minute on sheets, then remove to cooling rack.

Chocolate Coconut Cookies

German chocolate with extra coconut and a chocolate drizzle - a chewy, and fancy, delight! Makes 3½ dozen.

- 1 box German chocolate cake mix
- 1 bag sweetened flake coconut
- 1 can sweetened condensed milk
- 1/3 cup whole milk (or reduced fat) 1 cup milk chocolate chips
- 1 tablespoon salted butter

Using an electric mixer, blend dry mix, coconut, and milks for 1 minute, then cover and refrigerate for 2 hours. Preheat oven to 375°F. On ungreased baking sheets, drop dough by tablespoonfuls about 2" apart. Bake until centers are barely set, 11-13 minutes, then remove and let cool 5 minutes on sheets, then remove to cooling rack. Microwave chips and butter for about 1 minute, stirring at 30 seconds, until melted and smooth. Drizzle over cooled cookies, and refrigerate 5-10 minutes to set.

Peanut Butter Cookies

A new "old favorite"! Makes 4 dozen.

- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 1 cup creamy peanut butter

1/3 cup whole milk (or reduced fat) 2 large eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1/3 cup granulated sugar

Preheat oven to 375°F. Using an electric mixer, blend all but sugar for 1 minute, then drop dough by tablespoonfuls about 2" apart on greased baking sheets. Using a fork, gently press a crisscross pattern into cookies, then sprinkle them with sugar. Bake until edges are just firm, 9-11 minutes, then remove and let cool 3 minutes on sheets, then remove to cooling rack.

Iced "Something" Cookies

Three recipes in one! Use the first of each mix, dairy, extract, and topping to make option one, or the same with two and three for the other delightful cookies. Makes 4 dozen.

- 1 box white/yellow/spice cake mix
- 7 ounces sour cream/vanilla yogurt/ plain yogurt
- 1 stick salted butter
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon almond/peppermint/ rum extract
- 2 cups powdered sugar
- 2 tablespoons light cream
- ½ cup slivered almonds/crushed mint candies/diced dried pineapple

Preheat oven to 350°F. Using an electric mixer, blend mix, cream/yogurt, butter,

eggs, and half the extract for 1 minute, then drop dough by tablespoonfuls about 2" apart on greased baking sheets. Bake until edges are just firm, 9-11 minutes, then remove and let cool 2 minutes on sheets, then remove to cooling rack. Whisk remaining extract with sugar and light cream, then use to frost cookies. Sprinkle with toppings before icing sets.

Date Bar Cookies

Developed for dates, but also delicious made with plums! Makes 3 dozen.

- 3 cups chopped dates
- 2½ cups water and ½ cup lemon juice
- 1 box yellow cake mix
- 2 sticks salted butter, melted
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 21/4 cups quick-cooking oats

In a saucepan, bring dates, water, and juice to a boil, then reduce heat and simmer until very soft and thick; about 10 minutes; then let cool completely. Preheat oven to 350°F. Using an electric mixer, blend dry mix, butter, and cinnamon for 90 seconds, then stir in oats. Press half this mixture as a layer into a greased $13'' \times 9''$ baking dish, then spread the date mixture over this, then sprinkling remaining mixture evenly in small bits. Bake until topping is firm, 30-40 minutes. Cool completely before cutting into bars.






