





Acorn squash, apples, beets, eggplant, figs, mangoes and mushrooms – oh, I can go on and on about the bounty of fruits and veggies of the still warm days of September.

Eggplant and Mint

Ingredients

- 1 large eggplant, cut into 1-inch cubes (about 1 pound)
- 3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt, plus more to taste
- 1/2 lemon, juiced (about 1 tablespoon)
- 1 pinch sugar
- Freshly cracked black pepper, to taste
- 2 tablespoons fresh mint, roughly chopped

Directions: Preheat the oven to 400°F. Toss the eggplant cubes, 2 tablespoons of the olive oil, and salt directly on a quarter of the sheet pan and roast for 30 minutes, or until caramelized and tender. Turn off the oven.

Season the cooked eggplant with the lemon juice, sugar, black pepper, the remaining 1 tablespoon of olive oil, and a pinch more salt if you feel it needs it and toss together (I like to do this straight in the sheet pan). Place the sheet pan back in the turned-off oven for 5 more minutes.

Finish with the fresh mint and serve at room temperature.

Chicken, Apples and Apple Cider

Ingredients

- 4 teaspoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 1/2 pounds boneless skinless chicken thighs or skinless chicken breast
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 1/2 cup fresh apple cider

- 2 teaspoons Dijon mustard
- 3 medium firm sweet apples, cored and cut into 1/2-inch slices
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh rosemary plus additional for serving

Directions: Heat 2 teaspoons of oil in a large skillet over medium high. Sprinkle the top of the chicken evenly with 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Once the oil is hot and shimmering, add the chicken to the pan, top-side down. Let cook 4 minutes, then flip and continue cooking until the meat is cooked through and reaches an internal temperature of 160 degrees, 3 to 4 additional minutes. Remove to a plate and cover with foil to keep warm.

In a small bowl or large measuring cup, stir together the apple cider and mustard. With a paper towel, carefully wipe the skillet clean. Add the remaining 2 teaspoons of oil to the pan over medium high. Once the oil is hot, add the apple slices, remaining 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper, and rosemary. Cook for 5 minutes, until the apples are lightly tender and begin to turn golden.

Return the chicken to the pan and pour the cider mixture over the top. Let cook for 4 to 5 minutes, until the liquid is reduced by half. Serve warm, sprinkled with additional chopped rosemary as desired.

Seared Scallops with Green Peas and Mint

Ingredients

- 1/2 cups fresh or frozen green peas
- 1/4 cup fresh mint leaves
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 4 strips bacon, chopped into ½-inch pieces
- 1 large shallot, minced
- 1 1/2 pounds large sea scallops, patted dry and foot muscle removed

Directions: In a large pot of salted, boiling, water, blanch the peas until bright green and soft, about 3 minutes. Reserve 1/2 cup of the peas and transfer the rest to a blender. Blend, drizzling in 1/4 to 1/2 cup of water to reach a creamy



consistency. Add the mint leaves, a large pinch of salt, and a pinch of black pepper and blend until smooth. Set aside but keep warm.

In a large cast-iron skillet over medium heat, cook the bacon until the fat is rendered, 4 to 6 minutes. Remove and pour out all but 1 tablespoon of fat, reserving the remaining fat and setting aside. Add the shallot and sauté for about 30 seconds. Add the reserved peas and bacon. Cook for about 30 seconds more, then remove but keep warm.

In the same pan, warm 2 tablespoons of the reserved fat over high heat until just barely smoking, then add the scallops, and cook for about 2 minutes on each side.

Serve the scallops with the pea puree, a sprinkle of the bacon mixture and flaky sea salt if desired.

Sangria with Peaches and Plums

Well, you do need something to drink!

Ingredients

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 cup sliced peaches, skins left on
- 1 cup sliced plums, skins left on
- 1 cup cherries, stemmed and pitted
- 1/2 cup peach brandy
- 1 (750-ml) bottle dry Riesling, chilled

Directions: In a small saucepan, combine the sugar and water, and heat just until the sugar is dissolved to make a simple sugar syrup. Place the peaches, plums, and cherries in a large pitcher and pour the sugar syrup over top. Add the peach brandy and stir. Add the cold Riesling and chill until ready to serve, ideally overnight. Serve over ice, being sure to serve some of the stone fruit in each glass. Then, invite me over!



Asclepias tuberosa whose common names are 'Butterfly Weed' and 'Railroad Annie'. The former reflects it huge importance to Monarch butterflies as their host plant and the latter name reflects its choice of growing in the terrible soil of railroad beds in the mid-west. Flowers can be red, yellow, orange and the plants bloom from June to September. Lanceolate leaves continue bunching up the stem. The sap is much less milky than other members of its genus.

Liatris scariossa whose common names are 'Gayfeather' and 'Blazing star'. Depending on its likes, it will grow from 1 foot tall to as much as 5 feet tall. Tall, narrow, rosy-purple,

lavender or white spikes that bloom to down from mid-summer to fall.

Monarda didyma 'Jacob Kline' whose common name is 'Oswego tea' and 'Bee balm'. These showy red flowers stand out in any garden. Stout square stems grow to 3 or 4 feet tall and bear leaves that smell strongly of mint, which is its family. These plants do produce seeds, but much spreading is going on under the soil's surface.

Solidago rigida whose in the Goldenrod family. This tall, native plant has notably different leaves; note the softness of the under leaf. The cheery yellow flowers often bloom later in the summer than other goldenrod family members.

Vernonia noveboracensis whose common name is 'New York iron-weed'. The stiff, coarse stem grows 3 to 6 feet high. The crinkly leaves can grow 4 to 10 inches long. The dark-purple flower blooms from August to October. It loves 'wet feet'.

Clethera alnifolia whose common name is 'Summersweet' or 'Sweet pepperbush' for good reason. 'Delightfully scented', upright, terminal panicles of white or pink flowers spread their scent over an area in July and August. A clumpy shrub, it likes wet feet and enjoys sun or shade.

Aronia melanocarpa whose common name is 'Chokeberry'. Spring brings white flowers which give way

to small "chokeberries". In the fall the leaves turn pleasant autumn colors, and the birds devour the ripe berries.

Incidentally, the invasive plant trying to take over the cleared garden area is *Apocynum cannabinum* and its common names are 'Indian hemp' or 'Dogbane'. A rather remarkably toxic plant to horses, cattle, and sheep, it is reported that '30 grams of green leaves will kill a cow'. But if you look at the plant carefully, the greenish-white flowers are covered with honeybees and bumble bees.

Fredda Maddox

Fredda Maddox is the elected Sheriff of Chester County. She was elected in 2019 and was sworn into the Chester County Sheriff's Office (CCSO) in January 2020. I first saw Fredda Maddox in Hershey's Mill on Primary Day, when I had to tell her that even though she now lived right next door to the community center, she votes at the Golf Club. I never understood why things were set up that way, but I had memorized which villages voted at each location. I had seen the great presentation she did on Zoom for the American Association of University Women (AAUW), one of our most well attended meetings of the past year. I thought she would be great for our 'Getting to Know You' feature. It was difficult to get an appointment with her. She has a very busy schedule both during the workday and after, but I finally caught up with her during her workday.

Fredda moved to Hershey's Mill in November 2020. She had no idea when she spoke here while on the campaign trail in 2019 that she would be moving here just a few years later. Hershey's Mill was not on Fredda's radar when she started looking for a house last July, but her daughter saw a listing for a house on the internet that fit everything she was looking for and it happened to be in Westbrook Village. Fredda took one look at the house, and she had to have it. She

put her home on the market and she moved to Hershey's Mill.

Fredda grew up in West Oak Lane in Philadelphia and went to the Philadelphia High School for Girls. As a child she loved practicing competitive figure skating and ballet at her nearby recreation center. She has one sister, who now lives in South Carolina. Married at 33 and later divorced, Fredda has three children: Kari, 20; David, 22, and Hasanna, 23.

Fredda was interested in protecting and serving the public as early as childhood when she was an elementary school safety monitor. She earned a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice at Edinboro State College (now

Edinboro University) and a Master of Criminal Justice from West Chester University. She completed training at the Pennsylvania State Police Academy and FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia. After receiving her Bachelor's degree, Fredda became the first African American woman to serve as a Pennsylvania State Trooper in Chester County. She was then a Narcotics Agent for the Bureau of Narcotics in the Pennsylvania Attorney General's Office and a Special Agent in the Bureau of Criminal Investigations, serving in law enforcement for eighteen years. While an officer, she went to law school at night at Widener University.

After serving in law enforcement, she began working in the Philadelphia Public Defenders' office. Next, she advocated for victims, domestic abuse and child abuse as an attorney at the Domestic Violence Center of Chester County. Then she worked as an associate at the Rovito Law office and served as guardian ad litem for children in the Chester County courts before she was elected Sheriff.

The primary responsibility of the Chester County Sheriff's Office is protecting the courts. Other duties include prisoner transport, Sheriff's sales, gun permits, fingerprinting services and delivering Protection of Abuse orders, among others. The Sheriff's position is elected by the people as mandated by the Pennsylvania Constitution.

Since taking Office, Fredda has worked to build bridges among communities and law enforcement.

Under her leadership, the K-9 Unit has added canines Moose, Zeeke and Marley—the latter who just became the nation's first USPCA-certified police comfort dog. Her vision of starting a scholarship to the Municipal Police Academy to help diversify law enforcement in Chester County has been realized and is now taking applications for its third candidate. With the reduced pandemic restrictions, she has recently publicized the CCSO's children's car-seat inspections—free for parents, grandparents and any other caregivers aiming to increase children's safety.

In addition to her duties at the CCSO, Fredda is an adjunct professor at Pierce College, teaching Criminal Law, Juvenile Justice, and Legal Ethics. She is also on the Board of Trustees for West Chester Public Library, a Rotarian, and a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, an African American women's service sorority. She also helps with projects for local and overseas survivors of human trafficking.

Fredda was originally drawn to the Mill by its location, the perfect design of the house and the view of the pond from her patio. She loves the walking trails with her dog, Mr. Bailey (sometimes referred to by her family and colleagues as "Deputy Dog") but because of her busy schedule she has not had the opportunity to take advantage of other amenities in the Mill. She is friendly and likes helping people. She loves animals and music and if she gets spare time would love to improve her golf swing.

Their story started when their paths crossed in February of 2007. When a friend of Deb's called her up and asked if she knew a good home for a skittish







Visiting The Mill at Anselma, Chester Springs, Pennsylvania

In the July 2021 Guide and Digest, is an article "HERSHEY'S MILL DAM PARK' which describes the work being done at the former Hershey's Mill Pond. Hershey's Mill has been closed for many years but a short drive of 6 miles will bring residents of Hershey's Mill to the site, on Route 401, Conestoga Road, of The Mill at Anselma. This Mill is a working gristmill which was built in 1747. The Mill at Anselma, a.k.a. Lightfoot Mill is a small, 18th century custom grain mill. It is probably the only surviving one in the United States with its fully intact, original restored, colonial-era power transmission. A custom grain mill typically ground cornmeal and wheat flour for local farmers, not for

commercial distribution. As such, the National Park Service designated The Mill at Anselma a National Historic Landmark in 2005, one of only 2600+ such sites in the United States today.

The 22-acre site and surviving historical buildings are open to the public and cornmeal and ground wheat flour are available for purchase. Nestled along the Pickering Creek in Chester Springs, The Mill at Anselma is an extraordinary historic site demonstrating over 250 years of Chester County's industrial history. The first of eight grist mills established in the Township of Pikeland, The Mill at Anselma was never the largest nor the most valuable. However, it provided a vital local corn and wheat flour milling service for early settlers living

Wite at flour for local farmers, flot for


in Philadelphia's back country against the backdrop of a flourishing American grain economy in the late 18th century. In 1872, the Pickering Valley Railroad was built and connected Anselma's vibrant farming community with markets in Reading, Phoenixville, and Philadelphia.

The Mill's final miller, Oliver E. Collins and his family purchased and came to the Mill in 1919. As the great Depression descended on America in 1929, the Collins family resourcefully relied on their colonial-era grist mill to make a living. The family ran a water powered sawmill and cider press, milled animal feed, and operated the Anselma Post Office from their home. Mr. Collins created and assembled a water powered machine shop to create a repair service and sharpen mower blades and even cut hair for the local

residents. The French and Pickering Creeks Conservation Trust purchased and saved the closed mill in 1983. In 1998, the Mill at Anselma Preservation and Educational Trust was formed to reconstruct and restore the mill's grinding systems and buildings and to reopen the Mill to public use.

The Mill Trust has designated Friday, October 1st, from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. as Hershey's Mill Day with a rain date October 8th. We invite the Hershey's Mill residents, in addition to the public that want to come, to tour the old mill and trails and observe the grinding of wheat or corn whichever is featured on this day. There will be no cost to those attending but it is hoped that many residents of Hershey's Mill will take this opportunity to visit and support this wonderfully restored and demonstrated historic site.

Pain Awareness: Interpreting the Message

Pain is a condition the disrupts our lives. In 2001, the American Chronic Pain Association (ACPA) wanted to focus on pain for individuals and pushed to have a monthly health awareness campaign. September was established as Pain Awareness Month. Acute Pain is a sharp pain that seems to start quickly and can be severe. This type of pain alerts you to an injury and you need to do something to correct the problem. It generally lasts for a short period of time. While Chronic Pain is the pain that continues for weeks, months, and even years.

The type of pain you experience can provide you with valuable information so you can explain the pain to your Primary Care Provider (PCP) and develop a plan to manage your pain. Your pain may feel like a stabbing, shooting, burning, or prickling sensation or you be hypersensitive to touch, movement, or hot and cold temperatures. This type of pain is known as Neuropathic pain and involves damage to nerves. It is associated with diabetes, Shingles, stroke, Parkinson's, and various other illnesses. Medications such as NSAIDS or opioids are not as effective for this type of pain, so it is important that you talk with your PCP about treatment. Effectively managing the underlying disease is necessary as well as management of the pain itself.

Musculoskeletal pain results in damage to soft tissue or the bone. While pain that involves a bone, injury is easily recognized. This injury causes acute pain and can be manage by immobilizing the area, using ice, and

making sure you are examined, as soon as possible, to determine the extent of the injury. Other bone conditions, such as arthritis, result in a chronic pain condition. While medication can control some of this type of pain, the chronic nature of this pain increases the need for other treatments. Some of the treatments may include physical therapy, acupuncture, massage, and lifestyle changes to increase effective pain management. Soft tissue injuries are more difficult to identify and treat. The acute pain phase can be managed by medication but when the pain develops into a chronic condition, such as back pain, other treatments are necessary to assure that you are managing the pain syndrome as effectively as possible.

Discussing pain management with your PCP to explore all treatment options is important.

Over the years some of us have had injuries that resulted in acute pain and then persisted after the initial event. We were able to control the chronic pain but as we age, the pain control routine may not work as well as in the past. Some of the reasons may include developing chronic health conditions,

trying to maintain the same active lifestyle as we did when we were younger, etc. Being active is good at any age but as we age the activities may need to change. As a member of this active community, you can play Pickleball if Tennis becomes too strenuous, or a walk through the community can substitute for running. Listen to your body and the pain messages to assure a healthy life.

She had the opportunity to meet with Joan Marchetti, a long-time resident of Hershey's Mill who has lived in Devonshire for 40+ years. Joan was kind enough to share her story as a young child during the war, as well as the story of her late husband, Gino, who fought on the battlefields of WWII as a teenager, as well as on the football field, having a long and distinguished career with the Baltimore Colts in the National Football League [NFL].

Part 1: Joan Marchetti, Devonshire, interviewed by Anne Krepacki

Anne: Thanks so much for meeting with me and sharing the stories of both you and your late husband, Gino Marchetti. From the conversations we've had, I know that you and your late husband both have such interesting backgrounds, and I appreciate your sharing your wonderful stories with the residents of Hershey's Mill. So, I know you were born in Chester County, but when you were very

young, your Dad moved you and your family to the Germantown area of Philadelphia. Can you please tell me what it was like growing up in Ger*mantown, during the time of the war?*

Joan: Growing up in Germantown was wonderful! It was filled with different ethnicities that all made it such a nice place to grow up. We had the Irish grocer, the Greek tailor, and the Italian baker. We all knew each other, and we all got along! During the war, there was rationing, including gas, so my Dad sold his car and bought a motorcycle. Even as kids, my friends and I all wanted to do our part to

help at home and help in the war effort. So, we would take our wagons and go door to door collecting rags and bottles. Then we'd turn them in to the 'Rag Man' from whom we'd all get a few pennies for our efforts. Kids today would probably never be allowed to do what we did...like walk miles and miles or take buses. There were also a couple of theaters in the neighborhood, and we would go to watch the news reels known as 'The eyes and ears of the world' and we'd get to see videos of the battles, and of our guys fighting on the front lines. It was all quite a glorious time of real patriotism!

Anne: Your husband, Gino, was in the war and even fought in one of the most well-known battles of WWII, the 'Battle of the Bulge'. What memories did Gino share with you about his time in the war?

Joan: He was just 18 when he shipped out of New York City in 1944. He said it took them 7 weeks to make the crossing. They had to zig-zag across the Atlantic in order to avoid German submarines. They arrived in England and were stationed in Basingstoke while they awaited their orders to ship out. And yes, he did indeed fight in the 'Battle of the Bulge.' I'd have to consult his war records, but I believe he fought in the 69th Armored Regiment, part of General Patton's Third Army. It was a long battle fought during the winter. He remembers three of them having to huddle under one blanket in a foxhole

to keep warm. He turned 19 during the battle, January 2nd, 1945. As we all know, the US won the battle, and in order to celebrate, they wanted to drink some French wine. Gino volunteered to drive a truck hundreds of miles to where they knew they would find wine. He didn't really know how to drive a truck, but with a bit of help and determination, he did indeed make it there and back with a truck full of wine! They eventually marched to Berlin. Unfortunately, they actually had to wait outside of Berlin because of the treaty that allowed the Soviets to take control of the city. But he was there in Germany on VE Day, and he did remember the celebrations!

Anne: How did you and Gino meet?

Joan: We met in 1970 – we had both been married before. He had three children and I had four. He had a restaurant in Strafford and a good friend of mine worked in the office for him, and she introduced us. I told him how much my children loved his hamburgers! I guess you could call it a slow courtship. We got engaged Christmas of 1975 and were married in 1978. Later he would say that he wished we had married sooner. We still had nearly 50 years together!



Windows 11 – What?

The PC Club meetings have restarted after 17 months. We meet the 3rd Tuesday of each month at 7 PM in the Ardmore room of the Community Center.

Just when you are almost comfortable using Windows 10, Microsoft is gearing up a new operating system to throw at you. Windows 10 has been available for 6 years. In 2015 a Microsoft developer said, "it's the last version of Windows". Another Microsoft executive said that "Windows was not meant to be stagnant". Well so much for that first comment.

Windows 11 is in Beta test now and if all goes well, and it rarely does, it will be released in October 2021. In early July, Microsoft released an app that you could download to test your PC to see if it would be compatible with Windows 11. After analyzing what it performed, the app was pulled by Microsoft after a few days. Basically, it came down to certain components in your PC that had to meet specifications for Windows 11. It turns out

the app may have been faulty in its analysis and the bottom line was that any PC that is 2 to 3 years old would not be compatible with Windows 11. However, later Microsoft documentation has loosened the requirements for Windows 11. We will see how all of this works out.

Windows 11 will bring better user integration with a new Start menu and other features. You can look at it as a feature upgrade to Windows 10. It will be offered to Windows 10 compatible computers through Windows Update. So, what happens if your PC does not meet specifications? Nothing much as Windows 10 will still be supported until 2025 and will continue to be refreshed and updated with security enhancements.

Why is Microsoft moving on from Windows 10? First, it is a smart marketing approach. It brings new attention (eye candy) to compete better with Google' Chromebook and of course Apple. It also benefits Microsoft's pockets as Windows is the leading component profit maker for Microsoft.

Woodshop News

Bob Milano | Oakmont

Did you know that the Woodshop is not only one of many Hershey's Mill amenities but also a place to go where you can have that chair with loose legs repaired or that table with scratches refinished? The primary purpose of the Woodshop is as an amenity for Hershey's Mill residents who have an interest in woodworking, wood refinishing or just to have a resource that has the tools, machinery and finishes to fix something from the house or to get advice, guidance or help in making that toy chest or simple rocking horse that you have been thinking about for your grandchildren.

The Woodshop occupies what was the first Hershey's Mill Golf Club Proshop. Because of the shop's popularity, in 2018, the Master Association approved building a 1,000 square foot addition. The shop now occupies approximately 2,000 square feet which consists of a room containing 10 large worktables for the assembly of projects, a room for applying paints, stains and other finishes, a spray booth and two rooms containing the shop's large woodworking machines. For the safety of all that use the shop, there are two large vacuum systems to remove sawdust emitted by the large woodworking machines. Individual "Shop Vacs" are situated throughout the entire shop to remove debris from worktables and smaller machines. Access to the woodshop and equipment is limited to its trained members.

To partially support the cost of supplying tools, machinery, hardware and refinishing materials, those who wish to join the Woodshop pay a modest annual safety fee of \$100. New members are then assessed on their skill level and receive instruction on woodworking methods and the shop's equipment to accommodate their needs. The shop is open to its members seven days a week from 5am to 8pm. Members are expected to help by volunteering on Wednesday mornings, one or two months of the year, to clean the premises with others. This important volunteer activity also helps to keep costs down.

Most of the cost of keeping the shop running comes from repairs and refinishing furniture for residents. Please contact the Woodshop, we want to be available to help.

Finally, the Woodshop will be holding an Open House for all

residents on Wednesday, October 20, 2021 from 1:00pm to 4:00pm. Light refreshments will be served, and members will be displaying their woodworking projects, some of which will be for sale. Save the date and come visit this always popular event.
