





The Security Department is staffed by officers 24 hours per day, 7 days a week, 365 days a year, including all major holidays. When there is impending inclement weather, officers will often spend the night or work multiple shifts in a row, to prevent an interruption in service to the residents of Hershey's Mill.

Security officers respond to incidents ranging from medical emergencies, vehicle accidents, fires, trespassing, and searching for missing persons to resident lock outs. In 2020 alone, Security Department officers responded to over 2,000 alarms and over 475 incidents and emergencies.

Around the holiday season each year, residents can participate in the opportunity to donate to the Hershey's

Mill Security Department Christmas Fund. The money donated funds a Christmas bonus to the officers as a "thank you" for their service to Hershey's Mill over the past year. To contribute to the Security Christmas Fund, your donations should be placed in an envelope and dropped off at the Main Gate Security Center in the Office or Customer Service Mailbox or you can mail it to:

Nancy Sullivan

Lots of loving and hugs for these girls

For Nancy Sullivan, Hershey's Mill became a premeditated destination since the age of twenty. She observed the raising of her great aunt's home in Devonshire and loved the concept of the surrounding community. That lasting impression motivated Nancy many years later to commit to purchasing her home in Heatherton. Since the sale occurred during the holiday season, Nancy recalls finding her home a 'Christmas miracle'. To reveal the good news to her son, Ed, and daughter, Erica, she wrapped up a ceramic house for each to present on

Christmas Eve seven years ago. During my visit and interview at her home, I sensed the joy within as she shared stories of family gatherings, her love of plants and pets that have filled her heart.

Nancy was born and raised in Newtown Square. She is one of four siblings so "there was always somebody to do something with". They ran around from dawn till dusk in the great

outdoors amused by such games as capture the flag and flashlight tag. In addition, her dad's interest in sustainable living explained the menagerie of animals that often provided childhood entertainment. Her mother, a saint in Nancy's eyes, is credited with Nancy's knowledge and interest in plants. Nancy has vivid memories of beautiful tea roses, primroses, and double French lilacs. To foster stronger, healthier plants, Nancy frequently incorporates fireplace ash into soil and sometimes buries rusty nails there too. Who knew?

Rarely do you find a family that stays together like this one. Except for one sister living in Florida, Nancy's mother and aunt both live in separate homes in Brighton, her other sister resides in nearby Pin Oak and her brother in Lancaster. To top it off, both of her kids are working or schooling within an hour of HM. I discovered a similar loyalty in Nancy's pet household. Soon after she started her family, a puppy was added to the clan. Hilde (pronounced Hil-dee) is Nancy's seventh German Shepherd and one of six dogs she has rescued. Hilde is a neighborhood fav but Nancy walks her early in the nearby corporate center, so this pup's piercing bark does not disturb the HM peace.

Recognizing a pattern of caring and sharing, I questioned Nancy about her education and career choice. She attended Our Lady of Angels, now known as Neumann University, nursing program following graduation from Marple Newtown High School. She earned her bachelor's degree in nursing. After graduation she worked in a Delaware County hospital. She then earned her master's degree from Villanova and the distinction of being the first full-time candidate to complete their program. As such, Nancy was privileged to be interviewed by the National League of Nursing as part of Villanova's graduate nursing accreditation program. Critical care and surgery top the list of Nancy's favorite fields. She admitted to being a life-long learner, so it makes sense she chose such innovative, progressive specialties.

All work and no play, however, has never been Nancy's mantra. In her words, "I work hard, I play hard, and I sleep hard"! She accepted a parttime position teaching nursing at Delaware County Community College to support her wanderlust. Nancy began traveling and has continued to do so with great success and enthusiasm ever since. She is one of 20 cousins that love to tour together as often as possible. She loves discovering new places with her kids and other family members. Nancy estimates that they

have been all over Europe and visited at least 25 countries. They choose Celebrity Cruises whenever possible, and their timing is extraordinary. For example, they were in Germany during the fall of The Wall in 1989; France during a WWI Armistice celebration recognizing the oldest war veteran and witnessed Charles and Camilla laying a wreath at the Arc de Triumph; Oberammergau for the Passion Play performed every 10 years and in Holland for the 100th anniversary celebration of Van Gogh's death; Fiji barrier reef diving when labor issues at their resort caused an evacuation off the island. Another phenomenal sea trip included traveling through the Panama Canal

and back. But as far as I could tell, an unforgettable two-week Disney cruise, the first of its kind in Europe, that sold out in 15 minutes, is the family front winner. Twelve members of Nancy's family visited Barcelona, Sicily, Sardinia, Rome, Naples, Marseille, and Monte Carlo. On another Disney cruise in December, they were given a private dining room for Christmas dinner and Ed and Erica, ages 10 and 12 at the time, served Christmas mass on the ship.

Noteworthy excursions in the States included motor home trips to celebrate Christmas in Florida with their British cousins and a tour of East

Coast presidential homes. They also intentionally booked a paddle-wheel cruise on the Mississippi right after Katrina choosing to spend their vacation dollars in the U.S. Little known travel fact: locally, Nancy has served as a vetted driver for the men's and women's United States Tennis Association (USTA). Once, one of her pickups was Martina Hingis! The athlete's luggage was stolen, so Nancy took her, where else, to King of Prussia mall for pro necessities.

Hearing about these trips, from the planning to the launching, it became clear to me that Nancy believed respect for one another, importance of tradition and desire for learning were key components shared by all who follow her. As an example, she provided videos and books for her kids ahead of time to prepare them for the upcoming journeys. Sometimes she even created related word searches or prepared meals exemplifying what was to come.

Fascinated by such an extensive list of travels, I reminded myself that they were vacations spread over many holidays and vacations. Daily, Nancy supports this leading healthcare

I heard one woman say, after one of Nancy's unique monologues, "I want to go to the hospital where she works!" inferring that Nancy adds life to any situation. One day, as all the Merfriends waited in line by the pool, Nancy announced that it was her birthday and described the prep that would follow class to get ready for the evening's dinner theater celebration. Without any hesitation, one person exclaimed, "Nancy, you are a dinner theater"!

Nancy is a beautiful blend of sincere, servant *and* so funny!



for the Love of... Family Recipes

If Cleopatra was the face that launched a thousand ships, then, "How did Grandmom make those breaded asparagus?" is the question that started my writing our family's cookbook. I come from a long line of wonderful and imaginative cooks. Both of my grandmothers had award winning recipes. My great grandmother, an Italian immigrant, was a gifted baker. A treasured recipe she brought with her to America was her famous biscotti. This was probably true because, as I understand, she put wine in everything even my brother's milk to get him to stop crying. It worked!

Why a cookbook? Family recipes are a way of keeping our ancestry alive. The smell of most foods can evoke vivid memories of childhood and the family members who made them. Food can remind us of experiences helping us relive feelings of comfort and love. When I was quite small, I remember having breakfast with my Aunt Kay at my grandmother's home where our family of four was living. Why were we living with my grandmother? My Dad was offered two options after being involved in a slight 'altercation' with a man who called him a dago wop - either leave New Jersey or go to jail. We left Jersey that day and moved into my grandmother's house. It was a three-bedroom house already

occupied by four people. My brother bunked with my Uncle Anthony while Aunt Kay graciously gave up her bedroom to my parents and me and moved into a closet. I figured the least I could do was have breakfast with her every morning before she headed off to work. Her breakfast consisted of 2 pieces of toast, a cup of hot tea and a soft-boiled egg. She would break open the shell with a knife, scoop out the egg leaving a little of the white inside the shells and gave them to me. *Comfort and love*.

My recipe box was overflowing with the recipes given to me over the years. Some were typed, most hand written and a few illegible. I sent out notes, emails and made many calls to relatives asking for their favorite recipes as well as family photos. I thought adding a picture here and there would 'spice' up the book. Several of the photos I received dated back to the early 1900's, and some were accompanied with the story about the picture. Another idea. I'll include a story here and there just to 'spice' it up.

One evening as Jeff was looking through the mountain of pictures and stories that were accumulating on my desk he asked, "Where does this person fit into the family?" Another idea. Include family trees along with the stories, pictures and recipes. This



is an example of insanity breeding insanity! The decision to include family trees was made. The labor of love began and nine months later, "Relatively Cooking" was born. I had 85 copies printed and sent them to family, friends and relatives. The response was overwhelming, but not what I thought it would be. You see, I was so excited to get the books in the mail, I failed to have someone proof my work. The mistakes and typos were quickly and humorously called to my attention. My cousin Tony asked if I considered him a 'bastard'. "Why would I do that" I asked? His answer, his family tree had him being born two years before his parents were married and he was their second child! *Oops*. Another relative asked what type of peeled organs should be used to make the Cranberry Relish. Peeled organs? Oh, that's supposed to be peeled oranges. Oops. My brother called and asked what year had our dad passed? I replied "1991." His response, "you have him dying in

1987, 1989 and 1991 in three different sections of the book." *Oops.* Finally, my Aunt Kay called in such a panic I thought someone had died! Her famous eggplant recipe was incorrect. Not only was an essential ingredient missing but the baking temperature was too hot and the time to cook too long! *Oops.* To calm her down, I promised to send out a revision. The three-page revision entitled "Don't Make the Eggplant" was sent to everyone with corrections to recipes, family trees and stories.

Food has been a symbol of love and sharing for as long as man can remember. Making, sharing and passing down recipes is a wonderful way to honor and immortalize family. The memories and emotions triggered by the aroma of a pot of 'gravy' simmering with garlic, onions and tomatoes or homemade bread or cookies just out of the oven have no rival. Sorry fast food and TV dinners.



Thinking Outside the Box... the Brownie Mix Box That Is

Rosie Taylor | Princeton

The first brownie was made for the Chicago World's Fair in 1893 as a dessert for boxed lunches given out at the Women's Pavilion. Bertha Palmer, wife of Potter Palmer of Chicago's Palmer House Hotel, asked the hotel chefs to come up with something easier to eat than a piece of pie or a slice of cake and the rest is history. In celebration of National Brownie Day which is December 8, try 'spicing' up your favorite brownie mix. Each serves 10. Enjoy!

Prepare your favorite boxed brownie batter, add in any of the following mix-ins and, bake as directed. For all variations line a 9-by-13-inch pan with greased foil.

Raspberry Cheesecake Brownies:

Mix together 1 teaspoon almond extract, 4 oz softened cream cheese, 2 tablespoons softened butter, 1/4 cup sugar, 1 egg and 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour. Stir 1/2 cup raspberries into cream cheese mixture. Pour batter in pan and dot

with cream cheese mixture. Top with additional 1/2 cup raspberries. Get marble effect by drawing a knife through batter; bake until done.

Caramel Pretzel Brownies:

Mix 1/2 cup broken pretzels and 1/2 cup chocolate chips into brownie batter. Pour into prepared pan and scatter surface with an additional 1 cup broken pretzels. Bake until done; allow to cool completely. Melt 1/2 cup butterscotch chips and transfer to a plastic bag with a snipped corner. Drizzle over brownies.

Tropical Coconut Brownies:

Mix 1/2 cup chopped macadamia nuts, 1/2 cup chopped dried pineapple and 1 teaspoon rum extract into brownie batter. Pour batter into prepared pan and scatter surface evenly with 1 cup coconut flakes or shredded coconut. Bake until brownies are done and coconut is toasted.

Peanut Butter Layer Brownies:

Mix 1/2 cup chopped peanuts into brownie batter. Pour into prepared pan and bake until done; allow to cool completely. Mix 1 cup peanut butter, 4 tablespoons melted unsalted butter, 3/4 cup confectioners' sugar and 1/4 teaspoon salt until smooth and spread over brownies. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup mini chocolate chips.

Crumb Coffee Cake Brownies: Mix

1 tablespoon instant espresso powder and 1/2 cup chopped walnuts into brownie batter. Pour into prepared pan. Blend together 1 stick softened butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour and 1 teaspoon cinnamon; scatter crumb mixture over brownie batter. Bake until done.

Arrange pieces of goat cheese around the wreath, Sprinkle pistachios on top. Season salad lightly with extra virgin olive oil and salt and pepper.



Easier is Better, RIGHT?

A huge number of items and services are marketed to us as ways to make our lives 'easier'. The underlying assumption, of course, is that 'easier is better'. This article is focused on raising big questions about this assumption-especially as we age.

This article considers some examples of devices and situations in our lives which may indeed make life 'easier', but which are not necessarily 'better' for us because they result in less exercise or fewer opportunities for strength training.

For our age group, the idea of 'one floor living' is a strong marketing strategy, while it is also true that walking up and down stairs is a great form of exercise. I have recently noticed that when I need something in the basement, I also factor in how much I really need that thing versus the effort of going up and down the steps to get it. When I was younger, I never

considered this. Can you relate?

Recently, however I reframed this situation to the following: "each time I use the stairs, I get more exercise!" At one level, this is merely a mental trick, but this 'trick' really works: I truly don't mind going up and down as much. The task has become more

of a pleasure in that I remember that I am doing something good for myself.

As a tiny example, I am thinking about closing the hatchback on my car. Today, many hatchbacks close easily by a mere push of a button. However, my 2014 Honda needs to be pulled down manually. And my hatchback becomes really challenging

to close after it has been open for several minutes. At first this seemed irritating. Then I created a reframe: needing to really put some muscle into pulling down the hatchback becomes a form (although small) of exercising arm muscles!

As another small example, consider cleaning the glass stovetop. We can easily squirt white stovetop cleaner on the burners, wait awhile and then wipe the stovetop clean. Instead, I recently kept scrubbing with gusto!

If I had had more burners, I could have gotten a bit out of breath.

Also, regarding many activities, if we just do them as fast as possible, they can become aerobic activities. For example, I try to walk fast enough to keep up with my dog when she is trotting at full tilt. This is a challenge, and I can become out of breath. A person can vacuum at 'retired' speed or make the activity into an aerobic activity (unless you have the 'ease' of having a cleaning person, of course!). The same is true for sweeping the porch or shoveling snow (if you choose to use it as an aerobic activity before our HM shovelers arrive!).

Each example is small and may seem insignificant, but the truth is that these little differences in activity level could be significant over a whole day; in total they could amount to an hour of aerobic (or strength-building) activity per day! That is no small potatoes - if you really work with gusto, do you suppose you could get out of breath peeling potatoes? It would take a lot of potatoes, but you get the idea.

The Arboretum at Hershey's Mill

Did you ever know someone who called all evergreens pines? I have, but they haven't for long. By not seeing the diversity of life around us, we miss much of life's richness. Imagine our landscape without the evergreens in winter. Though the needles are protected against cold by a waxy coating that makes them less useful to summer insects, their long-lasting seeds provide a valuable food source for squirrels and birds year-round.

Just to be clear, there are a lot of pines—that is trees with long slender

needles in bundles. If there are five in a bundle, it is an Eastern White Pine (*Pinus strobus*) which is a native to the eastern states. If there are two or three in a bundle, it could be any one of a dozen species—some native some ornamental.

Like most evergreens, pines have cones and are classified as coniferous; but there are always exceptions to the rule—some conifers are not evergreen. Two that lose their needle leaves but create a majestic vista along Chandler are the southeastern native Bald

Cypress (*Taxodium distichum*) and the exotic Dawn Redwood (*Metasequoia glyptostroboides*). The Dawn Redwood was long thought to be extinct but was found in a remote valley in China in 1948 and has since become a common landscape plant here. There is hope for endangered species.

Two species that are abundant don't have classic needles—Eastern Red Cedar (Juniperus virginiana) and Arbor Vitae (Thuja occidentalis). Their needles are flattened along the stems—the Arbor Vitae in a plane so the branchlets appear flattened while the Red Cedar are rounded and bunched. Both species are native to the region and occur both naturally and as landscape plants in Hershey's

Mill. Red Cedar is a colonizer plant, an earlier settler in the full sun of cleared fields while the Arbor Vitae is more likely to be found naturally in swampy areas. Their quick growth and dense foliage make them valuable in the landscape.

Then there are the short needle evergreens. Hershey's Mills' iconic Norway Spruce (*Picea albies*) is a horticultural import that only occurs in the landscape. I call the three by my house "the condo"—home to several species of birds and squirrels both summer and winter. Eastern Hemlock (*Tsuga canadensis*) is Pennsylvania's State Tree. It is characteristic of the cool moist Appalachians but is under

severe threat by the imported Hemlock woolly adelgid, tiny insects that originated in Asia. The adelgid arrived in the United States more than 50 years ago after being accidentally introduced to Virginia. Their northwestward migration into Pennsylvania has essentially occupied the entire state. Not only the trees are threatened but as they die, the exposed streams rise in temperature and cold water fisheries are challenged as well.

Then there are the firs, Douglas firs, and more spruces. All good for Christmas trees – check out the varieties and learn to identify them at the local Christmas tree farm.



Has Your Credit Card Information Been Leaked to the Web?

Microsoft Edge - Password Monitor

That's a scary thought but hackers look for available credit card information to possibly exploit your accounts. It may happen in various ways, but a breach of a website where you previously conducted business may expose your personal information. If one of your accounts is hacked, you can be the victim of fraudulent transactions, identity theft, illegal fund transfers, or other

illegal activities. Never use the same password and username for your critical accounts such as your bank account and your credit card account.

The Microsoft Edge browser contains a feature called Password Monitor that will scan the Web using your username and password information when you visit a website. It won't work if you don't save your logon information using the Edge browser. To make use of this feature, when using Edge, a small window will pop up that offers to save your information



when logging into your account on a website. Once you save your information it will be encrypted on your computer, then scanned when you go on the Web using Edge.

Setting up this feature is easy. Open the Microsoft Edge browser. All Windows 10 users will have this browser as it was downloaded as part of a Windows Update. One requirement for Password Monitor to work properly is that you must be signed into your Microsoft account. To check to see if you are signed in, click the **Personal** icon (Headshot icon) at the top right of the Edge window. It will show your Microsoft account. Remember, a Microsoft account can be any valid email account from any Internet provider, such as Gmail, Yahoo, Comcast and almost any other provider. Click Manage profile settings, if necessary, to set up a profile that will create the Microsoft account. Click Add profile at top right of window. If you don't see that **Personal** icon, click the 3 horizontal dots at the top right and scroll down and click Settings. It will

open to **Profiles**. If you already have a Microsoft account, it will show under **Personal** at the top of the window. If not click **Add profile**.

Once you have verified that you have a Microsoft account, click **Passwords** in center of the window.

Scroll down to **Show alerts when** passwords are found in an online **leak**. Just to the right, click the button to turn on Password Monitor. The button should be blue when turned on. Below the button click the right arrow. Click Scan now to perform an instant scan of your saved passwords. The results will show in a minute or two depending on the number of saved entries. Below, is a list of all your saved credentials. In addition, Microsoft has written detailed information about Password Monitor. Click **Learn more**, near the blue button.

One other setting to check is at the top of the Passwords window. Make sure the button for **Offer to save passwords** is turned on.

The 10 Most Invasive Sites on the Internet

We all know that our online browsing habits are being tracked. Unless you take steps to prevent it, most websites see your location, what you are searching for and what you like. All this data is valuable to sites and services, as they use it for targeted advertising. Ever searched for something on Amazon and then seen an ad for a similar product on Facebook? That is targeted advertising at work.

Thankfully, not all websites treat you as a treasure trove of information. On the other end of the spectrum, the biggest culprits load their sites with hundreds of trackers.

There are plenty of ways for a website to track you. Some might be subtle, like an invisible pixel or cookies, while others access your device's GPS to locate you on the globe.

SurfShark, a VPN (Virtual Private Network) provider, analyzed a typical browsing session over the course of a weekend and noted which trackers were activated, who the trackers belonged to and where the information goes once collected. The investigation revealed that some

of the most commonly used websites hide up to 100 trackers, all designed to collect as much information on you as possible.

Stop sites from tracking you

If you don't want websites or services to track you, there are ways to stop them. Here are some suggestions:


Use a VPN to block your location. A VPN changes the IP address of your device preventing ads targeting based on your location and things you may have searched for. When you mask where you are from, in most cases you won't be served ads that relate to your area. See the article for further information on VPN's.

Switch to a secure browser that has additional privacy features. Browsers like **Brave.com** or **DuckDuckGo.com** have been developed to block sites from tracking you.

Browse using a privacy window on your browser.


Make your regular browser more secure by routinely clearing your cookies (delete history).

Restrict ad tracking in your browser, or block ads completely. For example, in **Google Chrome**, click on the menu icon and tap **Settings**. Next, select
