Bill Dolton

Listening to Bill Dolton, I learned that when he commits to someone or something, he is involved in every detail. Whether in the role of athlete, teacher, or musician, those who know him well would agree with that assessment. Within the Hershey's Mill community, where he has lived with his wife, Marie, in Merrifield for over two years, he cheerfully and whole-heartedly participates with enthusiasm and professionalism in all three capacities.

Let us start by describing Bill's dedication and commitment as a self-proclaimed 'accidental runner'. This pursuit is what has occupied much of his thoughts, time, and efforts since his retirement from Lower Merion School District in June 2009. As he admits, he likes looking ahead, not back. This makes it clear why he began a personal exercise program just before retiring. He began experimenting with exercising on a treadmill to drop some weight. Witnessing the benefits to body and soul, he upped the ante from walking to running. Once spring arrived, he transitioned his program outside. This move led to needing running sneakers. After his purchase, the shoe store contacted Bill about a free training program to run a half marathon (13.1 miles). Why not, he thought, since he was considering the Broad Street Run (10 miles). The store introduced Bill to a local club, Fast Trackers, out of Valley Forge, and a serious bond was formed

when he joined the group in 2010. So, at age 61, in September 2010 he ran his first half marathon, followed by the full marathon (26.2 miles) in November. According to Bill, runners are characteristically OCD (obsessive-compulsive disorder) type personalities, and he admits that he is no exception. He knew as he finished his first marathon that he had to run again to beat his time, despite the brutally difficult last six miles. His goal over the next few years was to improve his time.

Bill's weekly marathon training program covered 50-60 miles. It was usually comprised of one long run (12-20 miles), multiple daily short runs of 4-6 miles and, to complete

the training, as many runs of 6-8 miles as needed. He was quick to add how perfectly the HM environment supports his 'habit.' Since the Chandler loop covers 4+ miles, and the lagoon - including the access trail from Chandler leading to the lagoon - is 1/2 mile, he mixes and matches those segments to break up his training to gain a total of 4-8 miles.

At this point, our readers might be interested to know that Bill's brother and other men in his family succumbed to cardiac conditions. He believes that, on the advice of his doctors, his aerobic training strategically and sensibly benefits his overall health. One tip Bill likes to offer other runners is to choose doctors who are also runners. Hence, Bill's chiropractor, cardiologist, podiatrist, orthopedist, and primary care doctor are all runners! They comprehend the anatomical values of this type of exercise.

After achieving his best time at the Philadelphia Marathon in 2012, Bill decided to transition from time to quantity. A running club called Marathon Maniacs piqued his interest. To qualify as a member of this group, Bill had to complete three marathons in 90 days. He did so.

Amazed by the rigor of Bill's chosen outlet, I asked him if he feels that a prescribed diet is integral to his success. Bill considers himself a casual. recreational marathoner who recognizes the need to stay hydrated during races and

has found that bananas and peanut butter are his two most important foods before running because they are easily tolerated and sustain him. He points out that if he cannot talk while he runs, his respiration is too low so he must slow down. The Galloway method of pacing is also of importance in his training and application. Bill has personalized the method of interspersed run, walk intervals. They moderate his heart rate, change his bodily muscular mechanics, and minimize impact and thus injury. All are advantages that are especially good for older runners.

Bill has a wall of medals (see photo) to attest to his running accomplishments. The path he took to earn them is worthy, and he is willing to share it with anyone curious who would like to learn more. It seems fitting to end this portion of Bill's story with the fact that in

January 2022, Bill became one of twenty-seven people who finished marathons in fifty states at age 73 or more for the first time – something that took him ten years to complete. He celebrated the occasion with his wife and other family members in Hawaii. Perhaps it was his traditional night-before-a-marathon 'car bomb' that brought on the victory. The recipe is to first fill a pint glass twothirds with Guinness and then to fill a shot glass half full of Jameson whiskey and the other half with Bailey's Irish Cream. Then, drop the shot glass in the Guinness and drink fast before it curdles. Cheers to his 73rd birthday, 50th wedding anniversary, and being a finisher of the 50 States Marathon Club!

Aside from Bill's extraordinary success in running, he is also recognized as an outstanding educator in instructional technology. His undergraduate training at Westminster College in New Wilmington led to graduate studies at Penn State, St. Joseph's, and Temple. From college, Bill was hired by Devereux to collaborate with young men in its residential program. Bill's compassion for those youngsters spurred him to develop state-of-theart technology in the Lower Merion schools to help them overcome obstacles in communication. 

Throughout our lifetime, the issue of mental health has gone from being a secret burden to bear by the person and family to being accepted as a mental health issue that needs to be addressed as a health concern.

When someone feels sad, he or she needs to evaluate the length of time he or she is experiencing these feelings. You may feel down and have less energy after losing a family member or friend, developing a medical issue, retiring, or changing another important aspect of your life. This feeling lasts for a few weeks, but you can still get things done for your life. During this time, talk with family and friends about what you lost. Reminiscing about the events and that part of your life is good for you and brings uplifting feelings even though

you still miss what you have lost. A benefit when you share with your family and friends, is that they can give you feedback about how you are doing.


One of the first and most disruptive symptoms of depression can include trouble sleeping.

The time to be more concerned about depression is when the disruptive feelings are interfering with accomplishing your usual life activities over a period of a few weeks. One of the first and most disruptive symptoms of depression can include trouble sleeping. If you cannot sleep the way you usually do, try lavender,

warm milk, or a warm bath before bed. If these interventions do not help or stop helping in a short time, you may be more depressed than you thought. Some people try alcohol to help them sleep, but this is not recommended because it does not allow you to enter the sleep cycle that gives you the restful night's sleep you need. In addition, alcohol is a depressant, even though some of us have behaved in a silly or stupid manner when intoxicated, and may increase those feelings of depression.

As we age, experiencing some confusion and an inability to concentrate or remember things seems to occur more frequently. This is scary because we think of Alzheimer's, but it could actually be a

sign of depression. Be alert. If you feel you cannot remember, evaluate your daily experiences for other behaviors. If you are not sleeping as usual, feeling tired when you wake up, not wanting to do the things that you enjoyed in the past, like not being able to watch your favorite TV show, and these feelings are lasting for weeks, it may be depression. This is the time to talk with someone about your concerns. Talking with someone is the support you need to help you determine the best way to help yourself. You may want to talk to a friend or to your Primary Care Provider (PCP). Saying it out loud helps bring light to the situation, which then helps you evaluate the situation more easily, and you do not feel as alone as you had.



One In Being

Discord and divisiveness abound in the world today. An historian might question whether these times are any worse than other periods in history but the fact remains that our 'now' is quite disconcerting. Identity politics and debates over truth and alternative facts have driven a wedge between friends and family members over the past few years. Where can we find solace amid our frustration?

Religion, for many, provides a peaceful antidote for distressing moments in life. Buddhism offers helpful insight, sometimes using metaphors from nature and gardening. Hermann Hesse, in his classic work *Siddhartha*, remarks, "This is a stone, and within a certain length of time it will perhaps be soil and from the soil it will become plant, animal or man." From our limited

perspective based on the relatively few years we inhabit the earth, we fail to see the universe in its totality. Scientists, however, have long claimed that, over eons, matter continually changes without being created or destroyed. Material reality churns on in an endless

process of apparent birth, death, and reconstitution in new forms. It's as if reality changes, but never dies in a final sense.

These ideas are reinforced by Buddhist monk, Thich Nhat Hanh in *Living Buddha*, *Living Christ*. "...If we observe the things around us, we find that nothing comes from nothing. Before its so-called life, this flower already existed in other forms – clouds, sunshine, seeds, soil, and many other elements. ...It has already been here in other forms, and now it has made an effort to remanifest. ...When conditions are no longer sufficient (for life) ..., we say the flower has died, but that

is not correct.... Its constituents have merely transformed themselves into other elements, like compost and soil. We have to transcend notions like birth, death, being, and non-being." Of course, the Judeo-Christian and other traditions offer approaches to these mysteries of life as well. In fact, Thich Nhat Hanh includes in his discussion a reference to Jesus' parable of the mustard seed about the power of faith. However, Buddhism is most notable for its use of rich analogies from nature.

So where does all of this lead? German theologian Karl Rahner speculated that every particle in the universe has the potential to become a part of something far greater, even perhaps an element of the human brain. Somehow there is a mysterious unity in all things. If we can only focus on this 'big picture' of unity, we can be consoled that, in the end, there is no division, only oneness. Perhaps we can look beyond the discord and see within the depth of our being the authentic bond that joins us as brothers and sisters, sharing life with all that exists, from a speck of space dust to a chirping wren to a stunning dahlia to a precious newborn.

Ronnie

Ronnie is a handsome Yellow Labrador Retriever who enthusiastically interacts with people. He greets everyone with a tail wag and a smile while on walks with his owner, Kathleen McNally (Merrifield). When she stops to talk with neighbors, he sits close enough to nose into the conversation. Being a retriever, he loves to play 'fetch' and receive head scratches and pets. He is a wonderful companion.

Ronnie was whelped through the breeding program at Canine Partners for Life (CPL), located in Cochranville, with the intent of becoming a service dog. CPL is a non-profit organization dedicated to training service, companion, and medical alert dogs to assist individuals with a wide range of

physical and cognitive challenges. The goal is that with the assistance of their canine partner, the individual can gain a new level of independence. Some of CPL's graduates serve at courthouses, providing comfort and calm to people whether on the witness stand or just while waiting in the hallways.

Ronnie was whelped through the breeding program at Canine Partners for Life (CPL), located in Cochranville, with the intent of becoming a service dog.

Yellow Labs are well-known as intelligent, loyal, and food-motivated dogs who can be easily trained. The training at CPL begins in the early weeks while the pup is 'fearless.' They learn to adapt to loud sounds, different surfaces, human touch, and much more. At nine weeks old they start their first year of behavioral training (sit, stay, down, heel, etc.) and manners whether through the Volunteer Puppy Raising Program or the Prison Puppy Raising Program. At 14 months the dog is brought back to CPL's campus and is evaluated for what skills they have that will fit with the variety of jobs listed on the website (k94life.org). In their second year of training, a CPL dog receives training in such advanced skills as opening doors, fetching items, turning on lights, opening cabinet doors, and walking in such areas as city sidewalks or busy grocery store aisles. During this second year they are further evaluated and, if all goes well, paired

with a human partner, becoming a 'team.' Requests from individuals to be partnered with a CPL service dog come from all over the country.

This is where our sweet Ronnie ran into trouble. Although Ronnie completed his first year of training meeting his 'benchmarks,' it became apparent in his second year that he was not going to qualify for graduation! You see, while wearing his service dog cape Ronnie was too anxious out in public - which was exhibited through heavy panting, being too distracted, and the need to 'do business.' Ronnie flunked out. To put it nicely, he was unleashed from the program.

Kathleen met Ronnie while volunteering as a weekend dog sitter with CPL. She is trained to take the dogs out in public (while wearing their service cape) to support their ongoing training and socialization. This is how she met Ronnie. In September 2019, Kathleen applied to adopt Ronnie. That is how this handsome fella came to live in Merrifield. He really enjoys the quiet streets of Hershey's Mill, where he can go for walks and not have the responsibilities of a working service dog. One thing he has learned



at The Mill is that when the house phone rings and Kathleen says "I'll buzz you in," someone will soon be at the front door. He goes there ready to greet people with a smile, perked up ears, and wagging tail. Always ready to make a friend!



Chicken Marsala

The flour on the chicken should thicken the sauce. But if it's not thick enough, take about 1/2 c of the sauce and add some cornstarch. Put in microwave until it thickens and add back to dish. Mix it in. Serve with egg noodles or pasta of your choice.

Ingredients

- 4 to 6 thin-sliced chicken cutlets (If chicken breasts are thick, place between plastic wrap and pound with a meat tenderizer.)
- 1 small container of fresh mushrooms
- 2 c chicken broth
- 1 tsp crushed garlic
- 1/2 c marsala wine
- 1 small jar capers
- olive oil
- flour for dredging
- salt and pepper

Salt and pepper both sides of chicken. Dredge in flour, set aside. In sauté pan, heat olive oil until hot. Add chicken and brown both sides. When browned, remove from pan. In same pan, sauté mushrooms. Add chicken broth, wine, garlic, capers, salt, and pepper to taste. Place chicken in oven-safe dish (9x12). Pour sauce on top. Bake at 350 for 20 minutes. Yield: 4 to 6 servings

Peanut Butter Cupcakes

If you don't have buttermilk, add 1 tbsp of vinegar to milk and let sit for a few minutes. Also, you can use a chocolate cake mix instead of scratch recipe.

Ingredients

- 1/2 c unsweetened cocoa powder
- 3/4 c flour
- 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 3/4 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt

- 2 large eggs (room temperature)
- 1/2 c sugar
- 1/2 c packed brown sugar
- 1/3 c veg oil
- 1/2 c buttermilk

Frosting

- 1 c peanut butter (smooth)
- 1 stick softened butter
- 1 32-oz bag confectioners sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 12 mini Reese's peanut butter cups

Add cocoa, flour, baking soda, baking powder, and salt. Whisk together eggs, sugar, brown sugar, oil, vanilla, and buttermilk. Add dry ingredients to wet. Mix until smooth. Pour into cupcake liners. Bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. After cupcakes come out of oven, push peanut butter cups into middle of cupcake.

Yield: 12 cupcakes

Goshenville Post Office located in East Goshen Township



Goshenville grew up around a Quaker meetinghouse after being settled in the first decade of the eighteenth century. The meeting house was on the southeast corner of Route 352 and Paoli Pike. It was developed in response to the needs of this Quaker-dominated agricultural community. As a village, Goshenville supplied the basic necessities for this community - places for worship, cemeteries, a blacksmith/wheelwright shop, a post office, a school, a mill, a general store, and a grange, all situated along an important transportation route. This village also offered area residents the services of a doctor, a lawyer, and multiple trades. The local seat of government was also located here. East Goshen Township was incorporated in 1817.

History is made evident in the district's meetinghouses, cemeteries, and farmhouses, all of which maintain their eighteenth or nineteenth-century architectural integrity. The district's commercial



office, which took over what had been a general store, was operated from April 29, 1828, till January 15, 1904. Goshenville's period of significance began with the construction of the blacksmith shop and ended circa 1880, when the Sharpless stable was constructed. The village population in 1870 was 80 people.

The post office was located on the west side of the intersection of Boot Road & Chester Road. The first Postmaster was Azariah D. Williamson. The location of the post office was unchanged during its

tenure. The post office was a rural substation under the West Chester post office from 1900 to 1904. Succeeding Postmasters and their dates of appointment were:

Sharpless Lewis, May 9, 1836; James M. Watson, April 16, 1829; Jacob Minster, May 19, 1839; Edmund Reed, April 13, 1842; John Thomas, April 1, 1847; William Brooks, April 30, 1849; Silas J. Leedem, July 5, 1853; Samuel D. Hibbard, April 2, 1854; J. Lewis Hibbard, April 8, 1856; William Higgenbothem, September 13, 1856; Isaac Leedem, August 11, 1859; George W. Baxter, May 16, 1878; Mrs. Sallie J. Baxter, August 15, 1881; William Priest, February 3, 1882; Samuel L. Dick, February 19, 1890; Samuel W. Taylor, January 30, 1894; Kersey W. Rogers, April 20, 1897; and lastly, E. Taylor Biddison, March 22, 1903(?).

Isaac Leedem's compensation in 1870 was \$22 per year, and William Priest's compensation in 1882 was about \$40 per year.

Basic Bridge

Walt Woerheide | Springton Village

A bridge player is stopped for speeding. After a brief discussion, the officer sends the player on his way without a ticket. The bridge player knew how to finesse the situation! Today's hand requires a tricky finesse.

A bid of great convenience is the takeout double. Unless there is an intervening bid this bid normally orders one's partner to bid his best suit. If the intervening opponent bids, the responding partner is free to pass. In this month's hand, North has a standard one club opening with fourteen points and a balanced hand. East has a strong hand but no five-card suits. A one no-trump overcall might be tempting with one sure club stopper and a possible second stopper given that if he wins the bid for one no-trump, South will certainly lead a club. But such a bid would mislead his partner as to his point count and if South has a strong hand he could be in serious trouble.

So, he doubles, which in this scenario can only be a takeout double.

South could bid one heart over the double or he could pass. If he passes, he gives the opponents more opportunity to find a fit. If he bids one heart, he is showing a minimum of six points and possibly a five-card heart suit. In this case, he decides there may be a substantial benefit to waiting to see what the opponents have to say. A heart bid by either of the opponents would mean South would have difficulty making a heart contract and if the opponents end up in hearts, he has a good chance to set the contract.

The only four-card suits West holds are diamonds and clubs. But as North bid clubs, the best bid by West is one diamond. Note that in this scenario the diamond bid denies any four-card major. North has already bid the maximum for his hand, so he passes. East raises the diamonds, knowing there is no fit in the majors. South

now knows that West has at most three hearts and East has at most four. If either of them has less than this, then North could have anywhere from two to four hearts. So, bidding two hearts is a good competitive bid. In addition, as South has eight points and he knows North has at least thirteen, they have the majority of points. If North does not like the heart suit, he would likely try no-trump. North has good heart support and as South passed on his first bid he knows game is unlikely. North passes and South now plays two hearts.

West leads a low diamond to show he has an honor. South wins the first trick with the Ace. Because the double by East implies strength in hearts. South leads a spade to get to the dummy and then leads the six of hearts and

> when East plays low, South inserts the nine, winning the trick. South makes his contract by winning four heart tricks, two spade tricks, a diamond and a club.

'Deuces Wild' indicates a 2-2 score during a side's second serve. 'Woolworths' is a lopsided score of 5 to 10 during either serve. A score of 2-0-2 takes you 'All the way to Delaware,' as we say.

Since you can only score with the serve in Pickleball, things tend to heat up at serve number two, particularly when the score is at Woolworths, since the defenders face a loss when the serving side reaches a score of 11-5.

More About Moths

The fact that it takes 9,000 caterpillars to raise one clutch of Carolina Chickadees continues to amaze me. It isn't just the chickadees that need butterfly and moth (mostly moth) larvae to raise the fledglings we are seeing now. There are over 1,000 species of moths in Chester County - but how many moths, much less moth caterpillars, have you actually seen? They are there, we just must know how to look. Except for the White-lined Sphinx moth and the Glassy Winged Hummingbird Moth which hover like a hummingbird while collecting nectar with their long proboscis starting in late afternoon (see Guide and Digest July 2021), most adults are nocturnal, providing feasts for bats, birds, and spiders. If you are out after dark, try stretching a white cotton sheet on rope and turning on your porch light (or better, plug in a clamp-on light socket fitted with a CFL black light bulb). Sit back and watch or put on a headlamp and take a stroll through a garden of tubular flowers. The moths will be revealed to you.

Early sleeper? Keep an eye out during the day for a variety of caterpillars. The nests of larval Eastern Tent Caterpillars are obvious and offputting. Contrary to popular belief, these squirming colonies do not cause long term harm to the fruit trees, such as cherry, apple, and pear, where they nest. Though the nests are perhaps unsightly; spraying causes the more

devastating damage of reducing the meals available to birds and causes collateral poison mortality to other organisms. The adults are typical of the 'little brown flying bugs' that are too often considered dispensable.

Solitary, but not to be missed, is the up-to-four-inch-long Giant Leopard Moth caterpillar. Completely covered in long black spikes, it is intimidating but not dangerous. If frightened, it will reveal red bands at the segment joints—as if you weren't scared enough. Note that some spiked caterpillars are poisonous so it's best to leave all alone. The caterpillar feeds on many plants from dandelions to

sunflowers to oak trees. The large black spotted adult may come to your lighted sheet.

The Camouflaged Looper caterpillar devises its own protection. Depending upon where it is feeding—Black-eyed Susan, Sunflower, Goldenrod to name a few—the looper cuts pieces of the flower and attaches it to its body so birds (and you) might overlook it. Look carefully at the blooms in the wildflower meadow on the south side of the lagoon berm —you might find a

looper. It is barely three quarters of an inch long. The adult changes its name to the Wavy-lined Emerald; yes, it is green.

These are just a few of the many amazing moths. Caterpillars are easy to photograph, so be on the lookout. Send your pictures to get an

Hi-Tech and Lo-Tech Access to The Dog Exercise Area

The Hershey's Mill Dog Exercise Area (DEA) is open for Reservations and use by HM residents whose dogs are first certified through the DEA Committee. All dogs must have a current Chester County license and current rabies vaccination. To be certified to use the DEA, proof of both with a copy of the signed rules are submitted to the DEA Committee. These can be scanned and emailed (hi-tech) or copied and hand delivered or mailed to the DEA Committee (lo-tech).

The DEA Rules were designed by HM resident dog owners with the health and safety of dogs and residents in mind. Many dogs use the same space. The DEA Committee is striving to maintain a healthy, safe environment for all. The Dog Exercise Area is for HM residents and their dogs only. It is an exercise area where Hershey's Mill dog owners can exercise/play with their dogs off-leash within an enclosed

area. This is not a 'dog park' which allows for multiple owners/dogs at the same time.

Hi-Tech use of the DEA

The Dog Exercise Area is used by making reservations on the Hershey's Mill Scheduling Calendar, 'SKEDDA.' A resident may make one reservation per day up to five days in advance. Reserved times are currently 30-minute sessions.

To become Certified to make a DEA Reservation on the Hershey's Mill Scheduling calendar, Skedda, after all required paperwork is received and approved, the DEA Committee will notify you via email that you have been approved.

Instructions explaining the next step to be added to the HM Scheduling Calendar, Skedda, will be sent to you. If you are already a user on the Hershey's Mill Scheduling Calendar, Skedda, the

next step is to be cleared to schedule the DEA.

Instructions will be sent for this purpose. If you are already on the HM Scheduling Calendar, your Skedda credentials will be released to schedule time on the DEA column.

Lo-Tech use of the DEA

Residents whose dogs have been certified by the DEA Committee are free to use the DEA without a Skedda reservation if no one else is in the DEA upon arrival. Residents may check the HM Scheduling Calendar, Skedda, to determine any unreserved times before going to the DEA. If another resident arrives and states that they have a reservation, the resident without the Skedda reservation must leave the DEA immediately.
