

Undoubtedly, most residents have had the pleasure of observing the abundant wildlife that also consider Hershey's Mill their home; and even I have found myself pulling out my camera to photograph a fawn, bluebird, litter of fox kits, or even the occasional bald eagle while traversing our community. However, my frequent travels through Hershey's Mill have also led to a more sobering discovery... the many areas being used by residents to feed our local wildlife, especially the foxes and deer.

When wild animals are fed by residents, especially from a young age, they begin to view the feeding area as a safe source of provision; and because these feeding areas are usually close to multiple homes, these animals do not develop a necessary, healthy fear of humans, other animals, and human habitats. Subsequently, these animals begin following and approaching humans; and this leads to the need for the animal to be euthanized.

While their intentions may be admirable, most people do not realize how destructive, and even dangerous feeding wildlife can be to the animals themselves, our residents (yes, our residents), and their pets. For instance, in the last two years, Security has seen an increase in calls regarding aggressive behavior by young deer and foxes towards people and dogs. In one instance, a young deer attacked a dog that was tied up on its owner's front porch, and there have been multiple instances where foxes have approached people/dogs in parking areas, on sidewalks, or in their yards. One fox even approached

a golfing foursome and stole a golf ball right off the tee box. Obviously, this is not normal wildlife behavior, and it is inadvertently encouraged by residents who attempt to feed these animals.

While feeding deer may enhance wildlife viewing, decades of research has clearly shown that supplemental feeding leads to increased disease risk, long-term habitat destruction, increased vehicle collisions, habituation to humans and alteration of other deer behavioral patterns, and ultimately, the demise of the value of deer and deer-related recreation.

Foxes are omnivores, but their preferred food is rodents and birds. Feeding processed food or vegetables to wild animals can be like feeding a burger and fries to a newborn. Their systems just cannot process it. If foxes become dependent on a resident's feeding area, their desire to hunt on their own will diminish; and naturally shy and wary foxes begin to behave as though it is okay to be in close contact with humans. While that does not sound like a terrible thing, it is. For their own protection, foxes and other wild animals need to stay away from humans. If they learn it is okay to come into a backyard or up to a house for food, then they will start coming into other yards or up to other homes as well. These foxes will be in more danger of being killed or injured, as their proximity to human habitat will expose them to risks/dangers they would not otherwise encounter.

Please help protect our wildlife and residents by enjoying our wildlife from a distance, but please do not feed them!



John and Aoife Sullivan have been Ulster residents for five years after moving from Connecticut where they raised their family. Born in the Bronx, John was the youngest of four children. His two older sisters were in their late teens when John was born and doted on him so much, he says that he always felt like he had three mothers!

John attended Fordham University, joined the ROTC, and served one vear in Vietnam as a first Lieutenant Platoon Leader. The summer before the Military he took classes on taxation with hopes of a future job opportunity. He found work with H&R Block and eventually started a side business preparing taxes. John's niece, a college student, heard about John's business and directed a friend to him for help with her taxes. That friend was a pretty Irish nurse named Aoife (pronounced EFA). 

In 1961, an unusual partnership was formed when one of the youngest First Ladies, Jacqueline Kennedy, appointed a reserved octogenarian collector from Delaware, Henry Francis du Pont, to lead her project to restore the White House interiors. Together, they transformed the White House from a public residence into a museum, and along the way, they engaged with some of the most celebrated interior designers of the 20th century. For the first time, the story of this historic partnership will be told at Winterthur, the inspiration for Mrs. Kennedy's project. Through artifacts, archives,

and images, this exhibition will invite visitors to experience the behind-thescenes collaboration between the two. Their 'restoration' of America's most famous house became a history lesson for the country, awakening an interest in preservation and interior design that is still felt today. Breast Cancer AWARENESS

October has been designated as National Breast Cancer Awareness Month since 1985. There has been a great deal of support to increase awareness of Breast Cancer during the month of October. I remember going to Niagara Falls around 2003 and Estee Lauder paid to have the lights shining pink on the water during the entire month.

In 2022, the lifetime risk for breast cancer has remained steady stating 1 out of 8 women will be diagnosed with Invasive Breast Cancer. The risk for diagnosis can be age-related, but the age risk increases the probability of being given this diagnosis throughout our 70's and starts to decrease in our 80's when women follow the recommendation for mammogram screening schedule. At this time, 65% of breast cancers are diagnosed at a localized stage. This contributes to a survival rate of 99%. There is a vast amount of information which cannot be included in this article, so go to the American Cancer Society website which can provide more in-depth information about current statistics, risk factors, screening methods, and treatment.

Even though there have been billions of dollars for research, we still do not understand why one woman can get breast cancer and another woman does not get breast cancer when they have the same risk factors. Breast Cancer remains the most common cancer in women behind skin cancers. There have been two screening activities that are no longer recommended by the American Cancer Society, but may be known to you, they include Self-Breast Exam (SBE) and Clinical Breast Exam (CBE). Mammography is still considered the relevant screen method.

The American Cancer Society Guidelines for women at an average risk for breast cancer. At age 55, biennial mammograms can be done, but women, most especially women with risk factors, should have the opportunity to have annual exams. At this time, digital breast tomosynthesis, more commonly known as 3D mammography, is the recommended breast imaging testing. Many women complain about having screening mammography. Fear of getting this diagnosis and pain during the exam should not deter you, so please continue with them.

Guide and Digest **Survey Results**

John Groch | Chatham

Several months ago, residents were invited to complete a survey about their use of HMCTV, the Hershey's Mill website, and the monthly issues of the Guide and Digest. This report is a brief analysis of the Guide and Digest portion of the survey. Five hundred fifty-eight residents responded to the survey, with 99% reporting that they read the Guide monthly (89%) or occasionally (10%). Also, 72% did not read the digital version, while 22% did occasionally. One could say that these statistics are likely to reverse due to the high proportion of the general population under 60 who prefer digital sources of information. But for the time being, the print version of the *Guide* is likely to remain popular.

Based on combined 'monthly' and 'occasional' readership, the top three feature articles in the Guide are 'Community News' (98%), 'Resident Updates' (96.5%) and 'From the Main Gate' (96%). Close fourths are 'Club

News' and 'Getting to Know You.' Fiftytwo percent of respondents regarded the *Guide* as a major source of print information about the community, and 36% viewed it as a valuable supplementary resource.

Of special interest are the many written comments about the Guide or its component features offered by 206 respondents.

Respondents offered many positive remarks about the publication in general, and some named feature articles they were particularly pleased with. New residents claimed the information about the community and events helped them become better acquainted with Hershey's Mill. A number claimed to have found reliable vendors among the advertisers in the *Guide*. This is a significant observation because of the vital importance of ad revenue for the financial stability of the Guide. A subdivision of HMCTV, a non-profit organization, the Guide and Digest is fiscally self-sufficient and

receives no subsidy from the Master Association. Strong revenue permits the HMCTV foundation to provide grants to the community in support of special projects.

Some respondents suggested that eliminating the print version would cut the costs of printing, mailing and paper. But since the vast majority of readers prefer the print version, the potential loss of ad income would jeopardize the *Guide's* ability to survive. It may be possible, however, to remove residents from the mailing list if they ask to be removed. Some suggested bi-monthly or quarterly publication, but this was countered by the potential loss of ad revenue and the concern that time-sensitive articles would run the risk of being even more outdated.

The Guide staff are working on the following suggestions:

- Restoration of Master Association updates (formerly 'What Do Residents Want To Know?') and the Calendar of Events.
- Writing articles on the history of the Guide and Digest, the history of Hershey's Mill, and a possible column on scams.
- Other suggestions under consideration by the Guide staff include Dining Out and articles about arts and culture. A key to providing these additional articles is the recruitment of more writers willing to volunteer their services. My Encounter With a Hummingbird Moth

Recently, I was dead-heading my flowers one hot afternoon in my Secret Walled-Patio Garden and was pleasantly surprised when I had a visitor. I saw the most extraordinary insect gathering nectar in my garden. Luckily, I had my camera-phone with me and I was able to capture some interesting photographs.

It was a Hummingbird Moth, which I have only seen one other time during my life. It flitted from one blue verbena to another. The flowers had newly bloomed, so they were full to bursting with nectar and pollen. It is a rarity to watch them at work. This particular moth was so intent on

collecting nectar from the new flowers it was not intimidated by my presence. I considered this a very lucky day.

There are four species of Hummingbird Moths in North America. The Snowberry Clearwing and the Hummingbird Clearwing are the most common. Its name comes from its similar look to a Hummingbird, but smaller. It moves like a Hummingbird, and can remain suspended in the air as they unroll their very long tongue and insert it in flowers to sip the nectar. Physically, they are plump, and they open their tail like a fan. They tend to be a rich reddish brown. Like all Lepidoptera, their wings are covered by scales. They lose many scales causing the wings to look clear, thus, Clearwing.

They are day flying moths. In Britian they are called Bee-Hawk Moths. Their larvae need specific food plants such as honeysuckle, dogbane, and some members of the rose family such as hawthorn, cherries and plums.

This particular moth decided it would allow me to get close because the buffet was so delicious.



Minzi, a Canine Partner for Life





It has been a challenging year for Deanie Heller of Princeton Village since her devoted service dog, a ten-year-old Standard Poodle named Carlos, died unexpectedly from cancer. Deanie has episodes of atrial fibrillation and a lack of equilibrium due to damaged vestibular nerves. Carlos provided stability when walking, could sense Deanie's cardiac arrhythmias and provided love and partnership. He was attuned to Deanie's every need. They functioned as one.

Without Carlos, Deanie's world narrowed, and she was more restricted in her activities. She fell frequently, had to hold onto her furniture to maneuver around her home, and felt unsafe. She realized that she needed to apply to Canine Partners for Life again in hopes of finding another faithful friend.

Canine Partners for Life (CPL) is a nonprofit agency that breeds, trains, and places service and companion dogs nationwide. It is accredited by Assistance Dogs International. The dogs start their training at eight weeks when they are placed with volunteer families who concentrate on socialization and manners. The puppies then enter the prison system's dog training program for the next six months before returning to the CPL facility at one year of age where their service training begins. During this next year, the dogs learn specific service skills that include providing stability on stairs/rough terrain, operating lights/elevator buttons, picking up dropped objects, opening doors, helping with dressing, sensing cardiac episodes, low blood sugar and/ or seizures. The dogs are ready to be placed when they have acquired the necessary service skills.

Deanie 'rehearsed' three dogs, and Minzi, a two-year old Yellow Lab, seemed to be the best fit, so Deanie and Minzi spent three weeks together, six days a week, getting to know each other under the supervision of the CPL staff. They rode on public transportation and in cars, dined in restaurants, went to the movies, visited malls, shopped in busy stores, navigated traffic and practiced numerous exercises and commands.



After three successful weeks together, they bonded and Minzi was discharged to her permanent home in June where she has quickly adapted to her responsibilities.

CPL continues to monitor its service dogs after placement. Deanie and Minzi will be recertified by the CPL staff every two years and Deanie must submit a detailed report every six months, including such items as Minzi's weight, veterinarian visits, and responses to commands. If Minzi needs tutoring, the CPL staff will provide that service.

The cost of breeding, training and placing a service dog is approximately \$35,000, so Deanie had concerns about how she could afford Minzi. Concord Pets in Frazer helped Deanie by holding a fundraising event at which



time vendors contributed items for raffle baskets, customers left donations, and the employees and customers even provided items for a bake sale. Deanie is ever grateful to Concord Pets for helping to change her life. It was truly an act of love.

Canine Partners for Life is in Cochranville and their website is k94life.org. They can be followed on Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, and LinkedIn. The nonprofit organization welcomes volunteers and donations. Volunteer service dog owners are also available to speak to groups/organizations.

Ham and Split Pea Soup

Basic recipe by Emeril Lagasse, modified by Bob Zink



Ingredients

- 2 bags Goya dried split peas
- 2 bags Manischewitz split peas with seasonings soup mix
- 2 ham hocks (smoked if you can find them)
- 1 lb. rendered and crumbled hickory smoked bacon (I use Amish Market or Shady Maple bacon.)
- 16 tbsp unsalted butter
- 4 c finely-chopped yellow onions
- 3 c finely-chopped celery
- 3 c finely-chopped carrots
- 8 tsp minced garlic
- 2 lbs. hickory-smoked ham, chopped
- 1 tbsp ground black pepper
- 1 tsp crushed red pepper flakes
- 5 quarts chicken stock (If ham is salty, use low-sodium broth and add salt later, if needed.)
- 4 bay leaves
- 8 tsp fresh thyme
- 12 or more shakes of Liquid Smoke
- 16 oz heavy cream

Instructions


Place the peas in a large pot or bowl, cover with water by 2 inches and soak 8 hours or overnight. Drain the peas and set aside.

Score the ham hocks. Place in a pot, cover with chicken stock and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and let simmer for 8 to 10 hours (until ham hocks start to fall apart). Drain and set aside. Retain stock for use later.

In a large pot, melt 8 tbsp of butter over medium-high heat. Add the onions and cook, stirring, for 4 minutes. Add the celery and carrots and cook, stirring, until just soft, about 6 minutes. Add the garlic and cook, stirring, for 30 seconds.

Add the other 8 tbsp of butter and the ham and cook, stirring, until beginning to brown. Add the drained peas, pepper, and red pepper flakes, and cook, stirring

for 2 minutes. Add the stock from cooking the ham hock and the Liquid Smoke. Add the rest of the chicken stock you didn't use for the ham hocks, the bay leaves, and thyme, and let it simmer for several hours until the peas are creamy, stirring occasionally. Add more chicken stock as needed if the soup becomes too thick.

Render the bacon and then crumble it. Add the cream and bacon and stir until mixed. Remove the bay leaf and discard.

Adjust the seasoning to taste and serve immediately. (BZ tip - I serve with butter and garlic croutons, which you can make or buy - I buy because it's easier.)

Slow-Roasted Pork Shoulder with Peach Sauce

Courtesy of America's Test Kitchen Serves 8 to 12

We prefer natural to enhanced pork (pork that has been injected with a salt solution to increase moistness and flavor), though either will work in this recipe. Add more water to the roasting pan as necessary during the last hours of cooking to prevent the fond from burning. Serve the pork with the accompanying peach sauce (or cherry sauce or with a sweet-tart chutney).

Ingredients

Pork Roast

- 1 bone-in pork butt, 6 to 8 pounds
- 1/3 c kosher salt
- 1/3 c packed light brown sugar
- ground black pepper


Peach Sauce

- 10 oz frozen peaches, cut into 1" chunks (about 2 cups) or 2 fresh peaches, cut into 1/2" wedges
- 2 c dry white wine
- 1/2 c granulated sugar
- 1/4 c plus 1 tbsp unseasoned rice vinegar
- 2 sprigs fresh thyme
- 1 tbsp whole-grain mustard

Instructions

1. *Roast:* Using sharp knife, cut slits 1" apart in crosshatch pattern in fat cap of roast, being careful not to cut into meat. Combine salt and brown sugar in medium bowl. Rub salt mixture over entire pork shoulder and into slits. Wrap roast tightly in double layer of plastic wrap, place on rimmed baking sheet, and refrigerate at least 12 and up to 24 hours.

- 2. Adjust oven rack to lowest position and heat oven to 325 degrees. Unwrap roast and brush off any excess salt mixture from surface. Season roast with pepper. Transfer roast to V-rack coated with nonstick cooking spray set in large roasting pan and add 1 quart water to roasting pan.
- 3. Cook roast, basting twice during cooking, until meat is extremely tender and instant-read thermometer inserted into roast near but not touching bone registers 190 degrees, 5 to 6 hours. Transfer roast to carving board and let rest, loosely tented with foil, 1 hour. Transfer liquid in roasting pan to fat separator and let stand 5 minutes. Pour off 1/4 cup jus; discard fat and reserve remaining jus for another use.
- 4. *Sauce:* Bring peaches, wine, granulated sugar, 1/4 c vinegar, 1/4 c defatted jus, and thyme to simmer in small saucepan; cook, stirring occasionally, until reduced to 2 c, about 30 minutes. Stir in remaining the things and mustard. Remove thyme, cover, and keep warm.
- 5. Using sharp paring knife, cut around inverted T-shaped bone until it can be pulled free from roast (use clean kitchen towel to grasp bone). Using serrated knife, slice roast. Serve, passing sauce separately.



Sugartown Post Office

Bill Schultz | Chatham

Sugartown, a small crossroads village consisting of eleven properties, lies near the center of Willistown Township in Chester County. Despite being only sixteen miles from Philadelphia, Willistown has retained an open, rural atmosphere. The nearest towns are Malvern at its north end, and West Chester, the county seat, approximately six miles to the southwest. The Mill is also nearby. Sugartown occupies thirtynine acres of a slight plateau. Five roads — Boot, Spring, Sugartown, Dutton Mill, and Providence — nearly converge in the village, making Sugartown an important local transportation hub.


The Sign of the Spread Eagle, an inn first licensed in 1801, gave major commercial significance to the village. It should be noted that there were strong objections raised by the Friends community as to the effects

this business would have on the school across the road. The inn was licensed and operated under various tavern keepers and names without interruption until 1864. The names included Sign of the U.S. Arms, Sugartown Tavern, and Sugartown Hotel.

Eli Shugart, the tavern keeper between 1804 and 1805, is viewed as the source of the village's original name, Shugart Town. The building also housed the Post Office from 1853 to 1863. There is documentation in 1864 that for many years general elections and meetings of the auditors and public-school directors had been held there. By 1880, the tavern had ceased commercial operation altogether.

The first Postmaster for Sugartown was Isaac Powell, who started work on July 5, 1835. He moved the post office from the White Horse Hotel to his store. The area was originally served by






Map of Sugartown

the Willistown post office from 1831 to 1835. The succeeding Postmasters were: Garrett Pratt, May 21, 1838; Thomas Hutchinson, July 25, 1846; William Fulmer, April 19, 1847; Sharpless Worrell, June 10, 1847; William B. Sill, June 6, 1853; Francis Hickman, April 18, 1861; Lewis P. Worrell, October 3, 1863; Levi I. Hoopes, July 15, 1864; George Frescoln, December 27, 1865;

W. Davis Christman, November 1, 1867; George Riley Raton, January 29, 1868; J. Elwood Worrell, June 23, 1875; Hillery John, March 21, 1876; Ellwood Burns, September 14, 1885; Hillery John, again, April 26, 1889; Ella J. Burns, wife of Ellwood Burns, November 14,1893; Hillery John, for the third time, on October 26, 1897; and finally Clyde B. John, May 26, 1904. This post office was closed on December 31, 1913, and mail services were then provided by the Malvern post office.

Sharpless Worrell moved the post office into his store on March 17, 1869, and Ella J. Burns moved the post office into the saddler shop upon assuming the postmaster office. The annual compensation for the postmaster in 1860 was \$14.03. By 1870 it had nearly doubled to \$26.

Setting Up the Fingerprint Reader

Windows 11 offers several different sign-in options for your computer. Facial recognition and the finger-print reader are the two that require specialized hardware. Other sign-in options include the familiar password, pin number, security key, and picture password. Many new computers come configured with a fingerprint reader. This device speeds up the sign-in process and is the fastest option overall.

My Dell computer has the fingerprint reader embedded in the top of the On-Off button. Very cool, although it took me a while to locate it as it's an unmarked button.

Set up the Fingerprint reader by right clicking the **Start** button in the lower left corner of the screen, then click **Settings**.

Click **Accounts** on the left.

Click **Sign-in options**, then click **PIN** in the center of screen and click **Set up**. Follow the screen prompts. The PIN is required as a backup to the fingerprint reader.

After your 4-digit PIN number has been entered, click **fingerprint recognition** above in the list, then click **Set up**.

Follow the many screen prompts to lift and rest your finger on the fingerprint reader.

Close any open windows and reboot the computer to test the fingerprint reader at sign-in.

If you encounter a problem, you can still sign in using your PIN number.

If the problem continues with the fingerprint reader, you might want to redo the set-up process.



Basic Bridge

Walt Woerheide | Springton Village

In bridge, one way to generate an extra trick is to give the opponents a chance to make a mistake. Never assume the opponent will play perfectly!

In this month's column, South and West have standard opening bids of one spade and two diamonds. North is playing limit raise in majors, so with the nine high card points and one point for the singleton in the opponent's suit, he jumps to three spades. With the six-card spade suit and the singleton ace of hearts, South has an automatic jump to game.

As West bid diamonds, has a solid suit, and there is no indication of a better lead, he leads the ace of diamonds, which in this situation promises the king. If West then pays attention to the discards, he notes that East plays the nine on the opening lead. West also now knows that it is important for East-West to try to take their four tricks as soon as possible because dummy has a runnable heart suit that would be good for discards.


West next leads the king and sees that East's second discard is the seven. This high-low sequence would normally promise a doubleton. West West Dealer. No One Vulnerable. club, as asked, they will set the contract.

One may ask, wouldn't it be obvious to play the queen on the third diamond? The answer is no. Three trumps are outstanding, headed by the jack. If the queen is played, and if West holds all three spades, then West is guaranteed to win a trump trick. So, South must choose the lesser risk of East having the jack of spades or West having three spades to the jack. Leading the two of diamonds for the third trick gives South a chance to make the wrong choice.



now knows that as he started with five diamonds and both dummy and East had two, then West started with four diamonds. West could lead the ace of clubs for his third trick, but if South holds the king and East the queen, he is gifting South with one or two undeserved tricks. The better play to try to set the contract is to lead the two of diamonds. North will trump this trick, but if East can overruff and return a club they will set the contract. Note that by leading the deuce West is asking his partner to return the lower of the two side suits. If he led the eight, he would be asking for a heart return, the higher of the two side suits. When the two is led, as the cards lay, South will prevail if he puts up the queen. If he plays lower, East's jack will win the trick and if East then returns a



Understanding Medicare Advantage Plans

On October 15 (through December 7) millions of Medicare-eligible seniors will be entering the Medicare Annual Enrolment Period (AEP), which calls for thoughtful examination of the competing Medicare insurance choices.

The historically-dominant choice has been Original Medicare (Part A and Part B) for Primary Coverage in conjunction with a 'Gap-Covering' Medicare Supplement plan and a Part D Drug Plan.

The lesser choice, while growing in popularity, has been a Medicare Advantage plan (HMO or PPO) that covers Medicare Part A and Part B equivalent services and includes Drug Coverage and some extra non-Medicare benefits.

Better understanding Medicare Advantage plans is the focus of this article.

Unlike the 'Always-In-Force' status of Original Medicare plans and Medicare Supplement plans, all Medicare Advantage plans automatically terminate on 12/31 of each year.

Although most of the terminated Medicare Advantage plans are offered again for the new year in a similar name, there will always be premium changes and coverage changes.

Also, Medicare's precisely-defined and unerringly-allowed benefits of the dominant Original Medicare choice are well documented in the official "2022 Medicare and You" bulletin.

In stark contrast, the seven competing private companies offering Medicare Advantage products have uniquely-different documented benefits, representing each insurer's interpretation of what they are legally bound to provide. You should ask for the insurer's Evidence of Coverage (EOC) document to be better informed.

Unfortunately, these uniquely different interpretations of each Medicare Advantage insurer often lead to the great frustration of a 'Claim Denial'.

BASIC ELIGIBILITY RULES:

All Medicare Advantage plan enrollees MUST:

- Have Medicare Part A & Part B
- Live in the plan's Service Area
- Be a United States Citizen or be lawfully present

Medicare Part A is a No Charge coverage for most of us. There is a Medicare Part B coverage charge for all of us. The lowest Part B premium in 2022 has been \$170.10/month. Higher Part B premiums are the result of reporting higher Adjusted Gross Income.

Although there are 17 MAPD PPO Plans (Medicare Advantage with Prescription Drug) available in 19380, only two (2) plans get top billing due to the features of:

• A \$0/month Premium.

- 5 Stars in Rated Performance
- The TV advertised EXTRAS including a \$50/month 'Give Back'

Fifteen of the 17 MAPD plans fall below the 5-Stars rating and have NO 'Give Back.' Ten of the 17 MAPD Plans have monthly premiums ranging from \$45/month to \$165/month.

KEY DEFINITIONS:

HMO stands for Health Maintenance Organization, and the coverage restricts patients to a particular group of physicians/providers called a Local Network. When an HMO member uses an Out-of-Network provider, the member needs to pay 100% of the provider's bill.

PPO is short for Preferred Provider Organization and allows patients to choose any physician/provider they wish, either inside or outside of their Local Network. Note: The Out-of-Network provider does not have to accept the PPO'S reimbursement schedule and CAN BILL 100%.

STARS RATINGS: Medicare Advantage plans are rated from one to five stars, with five stars being an 'excellent' rating as to how well it offers members access to healthcare and has a positive customer service experience.

ANNUAL MEDICAL DEDUCTIBLE (up to \$1,000) is applicable only when using Out-of-Network providers.

ANNUAL DRUG DEDUCTIBLE: Up to \$250.

ANNUAL OUT-OF-POCKET (OOP) MAXIMUM FOR EXCLUSIVE USE OF IN-NETWORK PROVIDERS up

to \$7,550. When the OOP Maximum is reached, the plan will pay 100% of covered service charges for on-going IN-NETWORK services.

ANNUAL OUT-OF-POCKET MAXIMUM FOR IN-NETWORK/ **OUT-OF-NETWORK PROVIDERS** up to \$11,300. This arrangement most often accommodates the member who has one or more chronic medical conditions and needs to go OUT-OF-NETWORK for the services of a top specialist. Once a member uses an Out-of-Network provider, the IN-NETWORK/OUT-OF-NETWORK OOP Maximum becomes the ruling OOP Maximum. When the OOP Maximum is reached, the plan will pay 100% of covered service charges for on-going IN-NETWORK and OUT-OF-NETWORK services.

WHICH IS THE RIGHT PLAN FOR YOU?

Start with the known! Your current health? How many chronic medical issues are you currently treating?

Respect DNA. What illnesses/diseases do/did your parents and siblings have?

Respect statistics. At age 65, adults have one chronic health issue; at age 75, adults have two chronic health issues; at age 85, adults have three or more chronic health issues.

Understand Key Definition re 'Benefit Period:' Medicare's definition of a 'Benefit Period' for a Medicare Hospital Stay or a Skilled Nursing Facility Stay allows for up to six Benefit Periods in a calendar year. Therefore, a very sick Medicare Advantage member could incur multiple (up to six) rounds of outof-pocket medical expenses until the \$7,550 or the \$11,300 Out-of-Pocket (OOP) Max has been met.

Now, do the math based on your best guess of the health services you might need from the typical coinsurance payment schedule below:

EACH HOSPITALIZATION STAY

IN-NETWORK: \$360/day - days 1-5 OUT OF NETWORK: 45% of Charge

EACH NURSING FACILITY STAY

IN-NETWORK: \$188/Day - days1-100 OUT-OF-NETWORK: 40% of Charge

SPECIALISTS - OUT-OF-NETWORK: 40% of Charge

LAB OUT-OF-NETWORK: 40% of Charge

IMAGING MRI, MRA -OUT-OF-NETWORK: 40% of Charge

In these inflationary times, don't be penny wise and pound foolish.

BEFORE YOU LEAP, check on Network Providers, ask for plan benefits and evidence of coverage documents, do the math, and *explore* alternatives.



Many of you have seen Red-Tailed Hawks here in Hershey's Mill. A juvenile may be sitting in a tree in our garden area, for example. Usually, you can see these birds engaging in one of two main behaviors: either soaring through the air, giving the occasional territorial 'kree – ee – ah!' or perched high up in a tree, keeping a keen eye out for the movement of a tasty squirrel or mouse.

and the shoulders and body are very reddish brown.

Two closely related hawks can also be seen throughout Hershey's Mill: the Cooper's Hawk and the Sharp-shinned Hawk. The Cooper's is a mediumsized hawk with the classic Accipiter shape: broad, rounded wings and a very long tail. In Cooper's Hawks, the head often appears large, the shoulders broad, and the tail rounded.

Sharp-shinned Hawks are small, long-tailed hawks with short,







You'll notice the very upright position of their body when perched and a small belly band apparent on a very light buff-colored breast. In flight, the Red-Tailed Hawk's wings are usually spread and can easily be seen. They build their nests high in trees or cliffs and are permanent residents of North America.

Another hawk that nests in The Mill is the Red-Shouldered Hawk. Jado was able to closely watch a nest that was located near the entrance to Chatham Village. This is a mediumsized hawk with a slim body and long wings. Both the flight feathers and the tail have black and white bands,

rounded wings. They have small heads that in flight do not always project beyond the 'wrists' of the wings. The tail tends to be square-tipped and may show a notch at the tip. Females are considerably larger than males, something often seen in raptors. Sharp-shinned Hawks are agile fliers that speed through dense woods to surprise their prey, typically songbirds.

They are attracted to the feeder because of the concentration of food, but in this case, the food is the birds themselves. Although no one likes to see one of 'their' birds killed by a hawk, on a population level hawks have little, if any, negative effect. The number of hawks present is very low compared to the number of smaller birds at a feeder, and their hunting success is low.

A word of caution: think twice about using poison to control rodents. It can take days for the mouse or vole to die, during which time they become easy prey for a hawk. If a hawk ingests a poisoned rodent, this magnificent bird will also die.





What are QR codes and are they safe to use?

QR, short for Quick Response codes, are popping up everywhere. In Hershey's Mill, you will see them on the Dog Exercise Area, at the Sports Courts, and in the Community Center. The black/blue and white grids are used for everything from restaurant menus to website links.

QR codes are a type of two-dimensional barcode that contain data. They can be easily read by a smartphone and converted into useful information, such as a menu.

You can access the information for a QR code two ways. You can download an app by going to the App Store on your device and searching for QR Code Reader. Open this app, center the QR code in the window provided and you should be taken to the website or data provided by the QR code. Or, you can open your phone's camera app and center the QR code in the window

provided. The QR code's URL link will appear. Click on the link.

QR codes are useful and also a perfect way for cyber criminals to access your personal information. Cyber and digital crime is on the rise through emails, text messages, phone calls, false links, and now also OR codes.

Just as most emails, text messages, phone calls, and QR codes are legitimate, QR codes can also work much like fake links in emails that are phishing for your personal information or attempting to lure you into making a payment.

False QR codes have been used to mimic legitimate codes for fake tickets on parked cars with a QR code that takes payment, or QR codes on parking meters that capture credit card information.

QR code attacks are happening everywhere with alarming frequency. Here are some ways to protect yourself from false QR codes:

If you have any concern about a QR code, don't scan it. Instead go directly to the actual website. Any legitimate QR code should have an associated URL under it, giving the option to navigate there directly. If it's missing, beware.

Inspect QR code URLs closely after scanning the QR code; check out the URL it directs you to. Does the website seem suspicious, include strange misspellings or typos? Does it match the organization you should have been directed to?

Look for signs of physical tampering. If you spot a QR code sticker adhered

to a page over another code, be very skeptical.

Never download apps from QR codes. Websites can be cloned easily. Always go to the official app market for your device's OS and download your apps from there.

Don't make electronic payments via QR codes. Use the native app or direct a browser to the official website and log in there.

Turn on multi-factor authentication (MFA). With another authentication layer in place, a cyber-criminal cannot access your data with just your login and password.

Use common sense before scanning a QR code. Apply the same security scrutiny as you would with anything in the digital realm.


