The Hershey's Mill Security Department would like to remind pedestrians that they should utilize sidewalks where available. Where sidewalks are unavailable. pedestrians should utilize the shoulder on the left side of the road facing oncoming traffic to allow drivers and pedestrians alike a much better opportunity to see the other approaching. Also, if pedestrians are walking around at dusk or after dark, they should wear bright-colored clothing, reflective if possible, and carry a flashlight, to make them more visible to motorists.

Motorists are reminded to adhere to the 27 MPH speed limit along Chandler Drive and Mill Road, and drivers should always yield to pedestrians in crosswalks.

Keep in mind that Hershey's Mill roadways also have several "blind spots" that hide small rises in the road, curves, and other areas of poor visibility. In these areas, pedestrians should use extra caution and be aware that drivers may have a challenging time seeing them. Just because a pedestrian notices the vehicle coming toward them does not mean that the driver has also seen the pedestrian. Both parties should always use caution when sharing the roadways within Hershey's Mill!

Lastly, all pedestrians and operators of automobiles, golf carts, bicycles etc. utilizing Hershey's Mill roadways and walkways are required to abide by the traffic rules and regulations of Hershey's Mill.



The setting is 1953 on the Turtle Mountain Band of The Chippewa reservation in rural North Dakota, and is based on events from the life of Erdrich's grandfather, Patrick Gourneau, and dedicated to him.

Thomas Wazhashk is the night watchman for the Turtle Mountain Jewel Bearing Plant and the tribal chairman. The tribal council learns about House Concurrent Resolution 108, sponsored by Senator Arthur V. Watkins, a Mormon from Utah. Thomas devotes his efforts to fight against this resolution to terminate the U.S.-Native American treaties that gave Native Americans the rights to their lands.

The Night Watchman was the winner of the 2021 Pulitzer Prize for fiction. In it, Louise Erdrich creates a fictional world populated with memorable characters who are forced to grapple with the worst and best impulses of human nature! This is a majestic work of fiction from one of the most acclaimed writers of our time.

# SLOANE and OWEN KELLY

You are in for a treat if you visit the Kellys' elegant and cozy Merrifield Village home in May during the Showcase of Homes presented by the Paoli Hospital Auxiliary. Owen and Sloane are a couple who genuinely enjoy each other's company, the finer things in life, their Merrifield neighbors, staying active, and Winnie, their dear 15-year-old rescue dog.

Growing up in Mendenhall, PA,
Owen remembers his father, an
accountant, as a "hot dog and beans
kind of guy... a very humble man."
His mom worked hard and realized
her dream of earning a college degree
in her forties. Owen graduated from
Texas Tech University and returned
home to bartend for the summer at

the West Chester Inn. As fate would have it, Sloane was a cocktail waitress there. Chit chat about favorite authors ensued one evening. Owen asked her who her favorite was. Sloane answered, "William Faulkner." Owen, in disbelief, replied, "He's *my* favorite! We should go out sometime and talk about him!" They went out that very night. And William Faulkner never came up.

Sloane is a Massachusetts native but grew up in Westtown. She graduated from Elizabethtown College with a degree in Political Science. A selfconfessed homebody, she says her parents had to push her out of the

nest. Her father was a professor at the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science. "He was just fun. My mom was the first woman in our neighborhood to work outside the home." Sloane's mom is Inverness resident Marney Roia, who has been a licensed financial planner for forty years. Her profile appeared in the March 2023 *Digest* issue.

The Kellys moved to San Antonio, where Sloane earned a master's in public administration and Owen, a M.S. in Counseling. After experience as a school counselor, he became a high school principal, and then a principal in the state prison's school system. Owen created the state's first



prison-based training program in which offenders socialized puppies to become guide dogs for the blind. He also founded the largest vocational food services program in which offenders could achieve culinary certification while making meals for the underserved community. Sloane discovered an interest in criminal justice and worked as a probation officer in Texas' Adult Probation System. She subsequently took on the roles of court supervisor of the domestic violence unit, head of the job counseling unit whose task was to match probationers with employers, and finally assistant chief overseeing the gang and sex offender units,

and probation personnel in all 25 of Bexar County's courts including 125 probation officers and managers.

In 2013, the Kellys felt a tug to move back home but they were not ready to retire. They bought their present home and offered it for rent, arriving here in 2015. Traveling, reading, drinking fine wines, going to the movies, and enjoying the beach are shared interests. Owen plays golf at Downingtown CC and just for the fun of it, Sloane is serving up drinks again from the club's beverage cart full time during the summer season!



#### **MARY CAIRNS:**

# Educating and empowering girls in rural India to create a changed society.

APRIL 5, 2024, HERSHEY'S MILL GOLF CLUB 11:30 AM



"What you see in their eyes is a light. There is a joy that the non-schooled girls do not have. These are the girls who have hope. They are beautiful".

On September 11, 2010, Mary Cairns, a resident of The Mill, traveled to India for the first time to spend six months volunteering at a school for girls located in Uttar Pradesh in one of the poorest rural regions of the country. Mary had been searching for a long-term global volunteer project where she could truly make a difference in the world. She decided that educating girls was the key to improving the lives of children who lived in dire poverty.

Mary learned about Pardada Pardadi Educational Society (PPES), founded by Sam Singh, the first Indian to be hired by the DuPont Company in 1963. Upon his retirement in 2000 Sam returned to his ancestral village to start a school in a region where girls had never attended school. Girls are considered economic burdens in this region where an estimated 20% of all girls die before the age of five at their parents' hands. Girls are also often sold into the sex trade under the guise of child marriage.

Faced with staunch community resistance to the concept of girls being educated, PPES created an incentive package to encourage parents to allow

their daughters to attend school. In 2000, the school opened with forty-six girls. Today, over 3,000 students attend the school year-round with 97% of the graduates going on to higher education. The school has received numerous awards for its values-based education and community development model, which has been successful in changing their society.

Mary has spearheaded multiple projects at the school. She founded a health and hygiene program, raised funds to build a student health center in 2021, hired medical staff, built the Prana medical clinic, organized medical camps staffed with US medical volunteers, initiated an immunization program, and has taken numerous volunteers along with her to the school. Unable to travel during COVID, Mary worked on a COVID education and food distribution program providing sanitary products and economic relief for staff and for families of those who passed away during the pandemic.

Mary returned to India in October 2022 after a three-year hiatus due to COVID. Mary was completely

surprised to learn that a 20-bed hospital wing would be built onto the Prana Medical and dedicated to Mary "In honor and recognition of her outstanding commitment to the health and well-being of Pardada Pardadi Students".

Attend Mary's presentation on April 5 as she takes us to India to learn about her unforgettable experiences, projects, and efforts over thirteen years to improve the quality of life for some of the world's poorest children.

Two of the School's graduates, now attending college in New Jersey, hope to join Mary at the podium and will have framed original pen and ink drawings by students on display and available for purchase, with all proceeds going to the School.

#### News from the Malvern Public Library

On March 5, 4 p.m.-5 p.m., Robyn Young will speak about important women in Pennsylvania's history and how she obtained historical roadside markers for them. Entitled *Marking* a Trail of Women's History, Young describes how she received approval from the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission for 25 roadside historical markers honoring women throughout Pennsylvania. Known locally as 'the Marker Lady,' Young is the author of "Women in Penn's Woods: A History of Women in Pennsylvania," Young's book received a Preservation in Publication Award from the Heritage Commission of Delaware County. Her book will be on sale at the event.

#### **Duffy's Cut Historical Presentation**

On March 23, 1 p.m.-3:30 p.m., Bill Watson will shed light on a forgotten part of Chester County history. Fifty-seven Irish immigrant railroad workers died amid a cholera epidemic in the summer of 1832 and were buried in a mass grave just outside of Malvern, PA. The events at Duffy's Cut provide an example of the pervasive fear of contagion and of what historian Alan Kraut called "the immigrant menace" in early America. Bill is a Professor of History at Immaculata University in Malvern, Pennsylvania and is the founding member and director of the Duffy's Cut Project. He has spent the last 10 years directing the archeological dig at Duffy's Cut. Both events will be held in the Malvern Borough Meeting room (second floor).

# Useful but Hidden Windows Tips

Windows is such a complex system that many useful but perhaps unknown features lie ignored because of the Windows system itself. Perusing the Settings can be a tedious job so with a few keyboard clicks you can learn to implement some of these hidden features.

#### Move Windows on Your Screen.

It's easy to move windows around on your screen. Hold down the **Windows** key on your keyboard, then press the **arrow keys**. Pressing left or right will instantly move the window to the corresponding half of the screen. Pressing up or down will alternate between halving the window in the upper or lower portion of the screen or maximizing it.

#### Open two windows on the screen.

Select one window that will occupy the left half of the screen with a single left click in a blank space to activate it. Multiple presses of the right arrow will cycle the window movement through center, right and back to the left again (for example, press & hold the Windows key and tap the right arrow three times). The result is to have 2 windows visible with each occupying either the left half of the screen or the right half.

#### **Quickly Start your Taskbar Programs**

If you want to quickly start a program from your **Taskbar**, simply hold down **Windows** button and press the number

on your keyboard that corresponds to their position on the taskbar. (Be sure to use the top row of numerical keys, not the numerical keypad.)

#### Night Light

Night Light dims your screen slightly but more importantly it changes the hue from bright white to a warmer hue. Medical specialists recommend switching to this mode before retiring. It reduces the blue light from the screen allowing the body's melatonin to aid in falling asleep.

Type night light in the Search box next to the Windows Start icon in the lower left corner of the screen. Click Night Light under Best Match. Click Turn on now. The Strength setting determines how much hue to add. Set it so that the blue light is just filtered out. You can use it during the day too but consider setting a schedule that works for you.

#### **Adjust Text Size**

In Settings go to System then click Display. Scroll down a bit and change the Scale setting. Don't set higher than 150%, as doing that can lead to other visual alignment problems. Click Scale to set a custom value if you prefer (with a system restart). Under Scale, click Text size to adjust the text size. Overall, try to keep the Scale setting between 100%-150% while increasing Text size to a desirable level.

That's it for now. I hope you find these tips useful.



We have dined three times recently at REY AZTECA, located nearby to HM at 1257 West Chester Pike, West Chester across the street from Wiggins on Rt. 3. The driving time using Ellis Lane off Paoli Pike from HM is less than 10 minutes, so if tasty Mexican cuisine gets your juices flowing and you don't want to drive too far...then this is the perfect choice.

We went for the first time to enjoy an early lunch and were excited about the extensive menu items to choose from and were thrilled with the reasonable pricing. We tried the beef filled burrito; the cheese and chicken quesadilla, and both were served with wonderful sides such as Spanish rice

and lettuce that was fresh and nicely shredded. We had one diet Coke and a freshly brewed iced tea. We both smiled as we finished the lunch, and agreed that the fascinating Mexican décor was outdone by the really good food. We concluded we would return soon to test our initial conclusions.

Our second visit we orchestrated was a post lunchtime event near 2pm and we were pleasantly surprised that we were not the only diners in the midafternoon. Our dining experience was just as rewarding as our first time. So, we commented we had to return for dinner time to see how REY AZTECA and its all-male staff handled the dinner time fare and were anxious to see the dinner menu selections and

pricing. The lunchtime menu was truly tasty and very reasonable so we hoped that the dinner fare would not be disappointing.

We were not let down at all. The menu included about 15 combo platters all priced at \$15.50 so we jumped on those choices. Bill ordered the tri-items of one beef burrito, one beef hard shell taco, and an enchilada that was truly terrific. He also ordered a side of spicy, warm cheese queso which went very well with the free nacho chips served warm and crispy with a side of red salsa that was just spicy enough.

Patricia ordered a platter of Spanish rice with a chicken and cheese filled quesadilla and a nice helping of lettuce with pica de gallo and a dab of sour cream on top. We both enjoyed two diet cokes instead of ordering from the

bar menu (beer and wine selections) that is available. We skipped dessert as we had over-indulged on the warm nacho chips served in a large basket. Maybe the next time we will sample a dessert, but the chips are worth the 'price of admission' (as in free).

The parking is free and ample, and the seating choices are varied. Booths and tables of various sizes give you an array of choices for large or smaller groups. #### **Shrimp Creole**

#### **Ingredients**

- 3 tbs unsalted butter
- 2 tbs of flour
- · 1 large onion chopped
- 1 medium green pepper diced
- 3 ribs of celery
- 1 (15 oz) can no salt added tomatoes
- 1 cup no salt added chicken broth
- 1/4 cup tomato sauce
- 3 garlic cloves
- 1 bay leaf
- · 1 tsp creole seasoning
- 1/4 tsp dried thyme
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1/8 tsp cayenne pepper
- 2 pounds peeled, deveined medium shrimp
- 2 tbs fresh lemon juice
- 2 tsp fresh parsley
- 2 cup rice for serving
- Chopped scallions

#### Instructions

Melt butter in Dutch oven.

Add flour and cook until flour turns light brown-about 3-5 minutes. Add onions, bell pepper and celery and cook, stirring until vegetables soften, about 8 minutes.

Add the diced tomatoes, broth, tomato sauce, garlic, bay leaf, creole seasoning, thyme, salt and cayenne. Simmer uncovered, stirring occasionally until thickened and most of liquid evaporates-about 10-12 minutes.

Add shrimp and lemon juice.

Cook until shrimp turns pink, about 3-4 minutes.

Discard the bay leaf and serve over rice.



#### **Cod Francaise**

#### **Ingredients**

- 3/4 plus 1 tbs of water
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp black pepper
- 2 large eggs
- 2 tbs olive oil
- 3 tbs of butter divided
- 5 cod fillets
- 1/2 cup white wine
- 1 cup vegetable stock
- Juice and zest of one lemo
- 1 lemon thinly sliced
- 1/2 cup mantilla olives
- 1/2 cup kalamata olives
- 2 tbs of capers
- 1/2 cup chopped parsley



In a bowl combine flour with salt and pepper.

In another shallow bowl beat the eggs.

Dredge each piece of fish in the flour mixture and then the beaten eggs.

Heat a large sauté pan to medium heat and add olive oil and 2 tbs of butter.

When the pan begins to foam, add fish and cook for about 4 minutes.

When fish is completely cooked remove from pan and wipe it out with paper towel.

Add remaining butter and whisk the tablespoon of flour to the sauté pan. Cook 1 minute.

Add wine, broth, lemon juice and zest. Bring to a boil and simmer for 2 minutes.

Add olives, capers, lemon slices and parsley.

Put cod on platter and pour sauce over cod.

- 3 pounds Vidalia (or sweet) onions (about 5 medium), halved lengthwise and thinly sliced
- 3/4 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper
- 3/4 tsp granulated sugar
- 1 cup dry white wine
- 2 tbs all-purpose flour
- 6 cups beef broth
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 tsp dried thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- 1 small baguette, cut into 1/2-in slices
- 1 tbs dry sherry
- 8 ounces Gruyère cheese, grated (about 2 heaping cups; look for one imported from Switzerland)

#### Instructions

In a large Dutch oven or soup pot, melt the butter over medium heat. Add the oil, onions, salt, pepper, and sugar. Cook, uncovered, stirring occasionally with a wooden spoon, until onions are deep golden brown and caramelized, 45 to 55 minutes. In the beginning, you will only need to stir the onions occasionally.

As they start to brown midway through cooking, you will need to stir them frequently, scraping the fond (the brown particles) from the bottom of the pan. If the onions are browning too quickly, reduce the heat slightly or add a few tablespoons of water to deglaze the pan and continue cooking.

Add the wine and raise the heat to high. Cook, stirring with a wooden spoon to scrape any fond from the bottom of the pan, until almost all of the liquid has evaporated, and the onions are jammy, 8 to 10 minutes.

Add the flour and cook, stirring constantly, for one minute.

Add the broth, Worcestershire sauce, thyme, and bay leaves to the pot. Bring to a boil, reduce the heat to a simmer, and cook, covered, for about 30 minutes.

At this point, you can put it in a crockpot and cook on low.

While the soup simmers, preheat the oven to 400°F and set an oven rack in the middle position. Arrange the baguette slices in a single layer on a baking sheet and bake until the bread is dry, crisp, and golden at edges, about 10 minutes. Set aside.

When the soup is finished, remove the bay leaves and add the sherry; taste and adjust seasoning if necessary. If the soup needs a deeper flavor, try a few shakes of Worcestershire sauce. If it's not quite sweet enough, add 1/4 tsp sugar.

Adjust an oven rack 6 inches from broiler element and heat broiler. Set individual broiler-safe crocks on a baking sheet and divide the hot soup among the crocks (be sure the soup is very hot as it won't warm up much in the oven). Top each crock with 1 or 2 baguette slices (do not overlap slices) and sprinkle evenly with Gruyère and then Parmigianno Reggiano. Slide the crocks into the oven and broil until the cheese is melted and bubbly around edges, 3 to 5 minutes. Let the crocks cool for a few minutes before serving. (Alternatively, if using regular soup bowls: Top each toast slice with some cheese and return to broiler to melt, about 2 minutes more. Divide the soup among bowls and top each serving with two cheese toasts.)

Make-Ahead Instructions: The soup can be made and refrigerated up to 3 days ahead (without toasts or cheese), or up to 3 months ahead and frozen. Toasts can be made (without the cheese) and kept sealed at room temperature for up to 3 days.

#### **Zucchini Casserole**

#### Ingredients

- 2 tbs butter
- 2 medium zucchini, cut into 1/4-inch slices
- 2 medium yellow summer squash, cut into 1/4-inch slices
- 2 shallots, minced
- 1/2 tsp sea salt
- Garlic
- 1/4 tsp coarsely ground pepper
- 1/2 cup heavy whipping cream
- 1 cup panko breadcrumbs, divided
- 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided

#### Instructions

Preheat oven to 450°. In a large skillet, melt butter over medium heat; add zucchini, yellow squash and shallots. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Cook, stirring occasionally, until vegetables are crisp-tender, 4-6 minutes. Add garlic; cook 1 minute more.

Add the cream; cook until thickened, 3-5 minutes. Remove from heat; stir in 1/2 cup breadcrumbs and 1/4 cup cheese. Spoon mixture into a greased 11x7-in. or 2-qt. baking dish. Sprinkle with remaining breadcrumbs and cheese. Bake until golden brown, 8-10 minutes.

# RENEWAL

How many times in our lives have we asked ourselves, "Why did I say that, why did I do that," with regret? We've all learned the lesson that some things simply can't be 'unsaid' or 'undone,' much to the disappointment of ourselves and, unfortunately, others. # Indian Hannah

The earliest Indigenous people in Chester County were the Lenni Lenape Indians. One of the last living members of the tribe in Chester County was Hannah Freeman, more commonly known as Indian Hannah. Hannah's last years were spent at the county poor house, and it was there where her overseer recorded her life story.

Born circa 1730 in a log cabin on the Webb farm, which is now part of Longwood Gardens in Kennett Township, Hannah's father left the family when she was young and never returned. Consequently, Hannah was raised by her mother, grandmother, and a couple of aunts. Her daily activities consisted of making brooms, weaving baskets, spinning, sewing, and working for neighbors who were mostly Quaker farmers. Hannah also had a reputation among her neighbors for healing the sick with medicinal plants. She grew corn and vegetables on a small plot of land, raised cows and pigs, and caught fish and turtles along the Brandywine River. There is no record of her marrying or having children, but she may have had a common law husband named Andrew Freeman.

During Hannah's lifetime, she experienced a mass migration of European settlers into the Delaware Valley, forcing many of her people westward in search of more land. In 1758, she moved eastward to Chester Creek to live with relatives



and to avoid the violence between the western Lenapes and the colonists. A year later she returned to the West Chester area, and in 1764 she moved again, this time across the Delaware River to Woodbury, NJ to avoid the Paxton Boys, vigilantes who had murdered a Susquehannock community the year before. Seven vears later she returned to her ancestral land along the Brandywine River. Gradually, those closest to her passed on, her grandmother in 1775, her aunt in 1780 and eventually her mother in 1785. By 1790, Hannah's health was failing, and she gave up her small farmstead and began working for room and board for multiple Quaker households. In 1797, she was legally declared an indigent and in 1798 her Quaker neighbors banded together to form a pact they labeled "Kindness Extended"

to provide for Hannah's welfare. In November of 1800, she was admitted to the newly opened Chester County Alms House in Embreeville where she spent the last fourteen months of her life. She had requested to be buried in an Indian cemetery along the Brandywine, but for reasons unknown, her wishes were not granted, and she became the first to be buried in the potter's field on the grounds of the poor house.

In 1925, the Pennsylvania Historical Commission, the forerunner of the Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission, collaborated with the Chester County Historical Society to recognize Indian Hannah with a plaque on a large boulder

to commemorate her. Pierre duPont donated a plot of land for the monument along Route 52 at Longwood Gardens. When Route 52 was relocated in 2012 to improve traffic flow, the monument was orphaned along the abandoned roadway. It was decided to move the monument to a more prominent and accessible location, so on May 15, 2014, Longwood Gardens hosted a recreation of the original 1925 ceremony for the monument at its new location on the grounds of the Longwood Meeting House, just outside the main entrance to the gardens. Four descendants of the Webb family and members of the Lenape Tribal Council were present.

# 6 Scams Tricking Seniors Out of Money ALERT

Senior citizens continue to be prime targets of scammers. A Federal Trade Commission (FTC) report, Protecting Older Consumers 2022-2023, says that seniors reported losing \$1.6 billion to scams last year!

#### SCAM METHODS AND PREVENTION TIPS:

#### 1. Investment Scams

"Check out the person touting the investment before you invest - even if you already know the person socially," says the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission's Guide for Seniors.

Prevention: Look up an investment firm's or individual's disciplinary history using the "Check Out Your Investment Professional" search tool at Investor.gov.

#### 2. Business and Government Impostor Scams

In a business scam, someone pretends to be a business executive or payroll employee asking for information such as a copy of a W-2. That information can be used to file a bogus tax return, according to a warning from the IRS. Government imposter scams have grown 78% and take many forms.

Prevention: Never give your personal information to anyone you don't know.

#### 3. Romance Scams

These are common and occur when a person wants to believe the new relationship is real.

Prevention: If they're asking for money, don't give it, no matter what they say the money is for. You won't get it back.

#### 4. Tech Support Scams

Scammers say they work for Microsoft or some other tech company and that your computer needs a software upgrade. They may ask for access to your computer online. Don't allow it, as they could download a malicious program to steal your personal information. "At best the scammers are trying to get you to pay them to 'fix' a nonexistent problem with your device or software," according to Microsoft. "At worst they're trying to steal your personal or financial information."

Prevention: Don't give anyone access to your computer online unless you initiated the call to a legitimate company.

#### 5. Prizes, Sweepstakes and Lottery Scams

If you're asked to pay a fee upfront to collect your prize, it's a scam.

Prevention: Just hang up or say "No!"

#### 6. Fake Check Scams

The FTC says "In a fake check scam, a person you don't know asks you to deposit a check." It's usually for more than they owe you, and often happens when you are selling something. They tell you to send some of the money back to them or someone else.

Prevention: The FTC says never use money from a check to send gift cards and don't accept a check for more than the selling price. Even cashier's checks can be faked. Insist on meeting at the bank to accept payment.

#### BEST PRACTICES

With the ever-evolving variety of scams out there, seniors must stay diligent to stay protected. Resist pressure to act immediately. Don't pay out money in gift cards or through cryptocurrency.

Get a second opinion from someone you trust. Get to know your bank manager and ask questions you may have about financial transactions before making a move. Don't cave in to pressure to act right away.



# **Basic Bridge**

#### Walt Woerheide | Springton

When making the opening lead, the first thought is to make a lead that allows the defense to win a trick that it might not be able to win later. Hence, singletons and doubletons headed by the ace make good opening leads as they may give you an opportunity to ruff a trick while you still hold trumps. If your partner has bid a suit, that is frequently a

good lead, especially if you want to play with that partner again. If none of this is available, the best strategy for an opening lead is to try to do no harm. That is, do not give the opponents a trick they otherwise would not win on their own.

Last year this hand was played seven times in the Friday game at the club. It was played in diamonds twice and six times in three notrump, all by

the North-South team. A typical bidding sequence would start with North opening one diamond and South responding with his four-card major, despite how awful it is. North bids two clubs, which shows he has at least eight cards in the two minor suits. As South has hearts stopped, and he has fourteen high card points opposite North's opening bid, he jumps to game in notrump.

West has the opening lead. Against notrump, the most common lead is the fourth from one's longest and strongest suit, which would be spades. But West has a problem. If South holds the jack and ace of spades and

West leads a low spade, South will win two spade tricks. If West can wait until someone else leads spades, then he may eventually win three spade tricks. Two other strategies for picking a lead against notrump are to lead the unbid suit, which in this case is hearts, or to lead the second suit bid by dummy.

If West opts to lead the unbid suit, he will lead the three of hearts. Here, this lead is a disaster because East will eventually win two tricks and he would naturally return his partner's opening lead each time, especially as he has four hearts. The club lead succeeds if East can figure out to return a spade.

It turns out that the defense can set the contract by leading a low spade, the suit that looked least attractive as an opening lead. The dummy would win the ace but then when East wins the lead, he returns a spade and the declarer loses three spades, a club, and a diamond.

Some Souths would not respond with one spade because of the lack of honors. However, there are two good reasons for South to bid one spade. The first is North might also have a four-card spade suit. The second is that if they end up in notrump, such a bid would discourage a spade lead. The defenders who led spades did best on this hand.

Despite recent bull market trends and the relative comfort that most of us seem to enjoy, there are many unseen people who are hurting in our midst. In How to Know a Person: The Art of Seeing Others Deeply and Being Deeply Seen, NY Times columnist David Brooks insists on the importance of paying attention to others and recognizing the hidden pain and discomfort they may be experiencing. Glenda Brion, CEO and Executive Director of the Community Warehouse Project, is eminently aware of the needs of lowincome and disadvantaged members in our very own Chester County community. In collaboration with 80 housing agencies, schools and counselors, Glenda devotes her life to addressing the needs of the homeless and those facing the daily challenge of getting by on a very limited income.

As a founding member of the Project, Glenda has rallied community resources since 2017. With the assistance of program administrator, Christine Polyasz, and a corps of 100 volunteers, she manages operations

at two warehouses, one in West Chester (5,300 sq. ft) and an overflow facility in Downingtown (4,000 sq. ft.). These facilities are provided free of charge by E. Kahn Development of Malvern. Monday to Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., volunteers accept donations of furniture and household goods, then sort, size, shelve and package items for storage or delivery. Weekly, Gentry's Transport, LLC, makes ten to fifteen deliveries of furniture to families with demonstrated need.

The Project has succeeded in its mission largely due to its active Board of eight community leaders, including a lawyer, accountant,

bankers, and businesspersons, all of whom generously share their time, talent and treasure. The organization's convincing mission of ensuring "that every family and individual suffering from poverty or other hardships can live in a furnished home" has inspired donors and volunteers to provide furniture and household items to nearly 1,300 families and 330 veterans in Chester County.

# Fall Risks: Extrinsic Factors

In our last discussion, we addressed intrinsic factors that may increase falls risk. Intrinsic factors are those specific to the individual's body, such as balance issues, neuropathy, and medication side effects.

Other things, not specific to a person, frequently contribute to falls. These other contributors are extrinsic, or external, factors and are almost too numerous to name. They are often

things over which we have little control. They include other people or animals, slick surfaces in bathrooms or outdoors, clutter, cracked or uneven sidewalks, dim lighting or glare, incorrect use of a cane or walker, and on and on. Oh no! We are doomed!

Not exactly. We just must change the things we can and be vigilantly aware of others. Things we can change include adding grab bars and handrails as needed. Bathrooms are



the usual suspects for bars, but they can be useful placed near the entry doors to a home to assist with the step at the threshold. A step does not have to be standard height to pose a problem. Steps of non-standard height confuse our brains so that we do not know where to put our foot next. Many health issues, such as stroke, Parkinson's Disease, and multiple sclerosis, make stepping up difficult. Neuropathy or poor vision can make stepping down harder. Something to hold onto which allows us to use upper body strength for lift and balance can be a lifesaver, literally.

There are many ways to make bathroom surfaces less slick, ranging from standing on a bath towel in the shower, as once it is wet it will not move with you, attaching non-stick decals, using non-slip bathmats, or changing the surface itself. These adaptations have a range of prices, and some may not be your style, but there are options. Shower chairs and tub benches are available for seated bathing. Though similar, one or the other may work better for you. The pros and cons of each are worthy of their own discussions.

Many therapists start with removing all rugs. So long as they lie flat with no curling on the edges, and are non-slip, many of us can continue to enjoy floor coverings. However, the very first time you get your toe, cane or walker caught, out they go! Taping the edges is a popular, but faulty, plan. Tape wears over time so that it becomes unstuck. It may curl up, making the equivalent of a foot lasso.

For dimly lit areas, carry a flashlight outside the home and change the lighting inside your home. If glare is an issue, try various tints of sunglasses for various lighting situations. Light colors, such as yellow, brighten and cut headlight glare. Dark tints block sun glare. Something in between may suit your needs best. Experiment.

Using a cane or walker incorrectly can be worse than using nothing at all. Walkers are meant to stay on a level surface, not lifted up or down steps. If your only option is steps, ask for help. Lifting a walker off a curb is what started this whole series of articles.

## **Deciduous Conifers?**

As a recently arrived resident to Hershey's Mill, I was struck by the beauty of the Bald Cypress trees lining Chandler Drive across from the nature trail and sports center. The Bald Cypress is native to the Southeastern US. It is also one of three species that has needles, much like evergreens, but lose their needles in the winter, thereby termed a deciduous conifer. The fall transformation of the needles results in striking colors, like the changing of the leaves with which we are all familiar. The tree is adapted to swampy soil. They have unique roots which are termed "knees" or pneumatophores which reach upward to gather air for the root system when the roots are submerged underwater. Those of you who have explored the mangrove groves in Florida are familiar with these root structures. The trees in HM are in proximity to the waterways and lowlands in which they thrive. Although there are no submerged trees in the ponds in The Mill, the roots of one specimen extend to Ridley Creek where knees appear. Bald Cypress are slow growing and long-lived, sometimes for 600 years or more. They form round cones which contain seeds enjoyed by birds and squirrels.

Another of the deciduous conifers is the *Metasequoia glyptostroboides* or Dawn Redwood. This species was known to exist until the ice age as determined by paleobotanists in the 1940's using fossil records but was thought to be extinct for millions of years. It was named *Metasequoia* due to similarities with the Sequoia tree. However, during World War II, a living specimen of the tree was found in China. The seeds were collected by botanists and were distributed to institutions in China, Ireland and the United States. (The entire

historical story and controversy of this discovery can be read at *The Metasequoia Mystery* | Landscape Architecture Magazine.) The seeds brought to the US were planted in the Arnold Arboretum at Harvard, one of the world's largest living museums of trees, where the original trees remain. Seedlings were sent elsewhere in the US, and there is a specimen raised from those seedlings at Winterthur Estate in Delaware by Henry DuPont, an infamous businessman but also noted horticulturist. There are also several at Longwood Gardens that are said to have the widest girth of any *Metasequoia*. At the end of the last century, it was declared "tree of the century" by the Arnold Arboretum. Before moving to Hershey's Mill,

we had a specimen in our yard in Rochester, NY, likely planted in the 1960's. Each year, the green needles turned brown, then are lost over several weeks, only to regenerate in the spring. I have been told that there is a Metasequoia in Hershey's Mill. Let me know if you find it.

The type of deciduous conifer is the Larch tree, also known as a Larix or Tamarac, which belongs to the pine family, but also loses its needles for winter like the bald cypress. It is native to colder climes, and is a feature in the fall in Canada, especially around Banff because of the distinctive yellow color of the needles. Mill residents can check out several varieties of larch trees in the Morris Arboretum.
